DECREASE IN TRADE DISPUTES IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—There was a considerable decrease in the number of trade disputes in Canada during August, as compared with the number during the previous month and corresponding month last year.

USE OF OLD WARSHIPS.

(From the N. Y. Medical Journal.) A resolution, offered by Dr. S. Adolphus Knopf, of New York, and adopted unanimously at the Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene, held in Buffalo, N. Y., in August, indorses the proposal to use old, discarded battleships as sanatoria or preventoria, and expresses the hope that our government will follow the example set by the Italian Secretary of Marine, who authorized three old warships of that nation to be converted into floating sanatoria for the treatment of children suffering from tuberculosis.

The French government evidently appreciated the importance of these points several decades ago, when for the care of the tuberculous, scrofulous, or rachitic children of the poor, it established large and excellently equipped hospitals on its seacoast, where these puny sufferers are assured of the benefits of the sea air, ozone and of the healing iodine and other halogen salts liberated from the breaking waves.

In addition, appropriate diet, its generous amounts, careful nursing and adequate medical care of their "white swellings" and other ailments are furnished. Hence, instead of early death, or what is worse, the prospect of growing up weaklings, cripples, or hunchbacks, most of these children acquire stronger constitutions and have a happy and useful future assured them.

Our Sea Breezes, on Coney Island, New York, was modeled after one of those French hospitaux maritimes for tuberculous children. Of the same nature is also the work of St. John's Guild, which summer after summer, for many years past, has been working its life saving wonders for the metropolis.

The importance of all these facts becomes apparent when we realize that, as stated in the preamble concerning the use of discarded battleships, nearly 1,000,000 tuberculous children are attending school in the United States, while there is hardly accommodation for 1,500 to receive instruction in the open air.

DOCTOR'S KNIFE CURES CRIMINAL.

From a habitual criminal, showing at times violent insanity, Jeff Lee, a prisoner at the Canon City penitentiary, has been transformed into a gentle, quiet man, perfectly sane. The skill of the surgeon has made Jeff Lee a new man, without criminal tendencies, and without a trace of his old mania.

Until the operation half of Lee's twenty years had been filled with criminal acts and periods of insanity. He went to the penitentiary December 16, 1912, to serve from two to five years for burglary and grand larceny. He was sullen and mean. He did not obey the rules. He was considered a dangerous prisoner. Two months ago he attacked a fellow-worker in one of the road camps, and after that he was placed in a straight jacket and was considered an incurable maniac.

So the warden consulted Lee's parents and they agreed that the operation be performed. He was taken in a straight jacket to the prison hospital and there the physicians scraped the skull where it had been dented, and removed broken pieces of bone that pressed downward upon the tender membrane of the cerebrum. A misplaced piece of bone had made Jeff Lee a criminal.

And Jeff Lee became better steadily. He regained his appetite and each day gave new signs of renewed intelligence. He is now in almost perfect control mentally and physically, and Warden Tynan says he believes Lee's moral sense is as it was when he was a small boy—that he would not now consciously do wrong. "And what it may lead to none of us knows," the warden said yesterday. "It might mean that hundreds of our habitual criminals and our insane may be cured, that their badness and insanity are attributable to a pressure of bone on the brain, the result of birth or accident. And it is certain that any such case can be cured, as was Lee's."
