U. N. B. Wins Opener In N.B.-P.E.I. Inter-Collegiate Finals To Take Strong Lead

FREDERICTON, Oct. 28 — (CP) — University of New Brunswick ruggers, aiming to repeat football victory, took a good stride in that direction Saturday by blanking St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, 6-0 in the opening contest of a two-game total-score series for the N.B.-P.E.I. Inter-Collegiate title. The second and deciding game will be played at St. Dunstan's next Saturday. Bell scored a try in the first half and Doherty crossed the Charlottetown line in the second. Canadiens Swamp Black Hawks 8-4

MONTREAL, Oct. 28 — (CP) — Canadiens' attack was the National Hockey League championship in the last two seasons, Montreal Canadiens swamped Chicago Black Hawks for an 8-4 victory Saturday night before an estimated crowd of 12,000. Peteran Toe Blake and rookie Bill Reay paced the Montreal offense with a brace of goals each, while Jimmy Johnston scored two goals for Hawks. Other Canadiens scores came off the sticks of Buddy O'Connor, Maurice Richard, Elmer Lach and Joe Benoit while Don Grosso and Max Bentley were the other Chicago marksmen.

Canadiens' famed punch line of Richard-Lach-Blake again carried the major part of the Montreal attack, contributing four goals to Canadiens' total. Summary: First Period: 1—Montreal, Blake (Lach) 4-0.

Red Wings Hand Boston Bruins 7-0 Whitewashing

DETROIT, Oct. 28 — (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings impressed their largest opening day hockey turnout in history tonight by whitewashing Boston Bruins, 7-0 with 13,748 customers looking on. Left winger Adam Brown scored three goals. Detroit's youthful goal tender, Harry Lumley, turned away only 13 Boston shots on goal in hanging up the league's first shutout of the young season. The Red Wings made things hot for Bibeault all night, giving the Boston net-minder 36 chances. The defeat was the second this season for Boston, which also has tied Toronto.

P. W. C. Ruggers Take 5-0 Win From Mt. A.

Playing through seventy minutes of a wind-driven rain, Gordon Bennett's P.W.C. football squad Saturday afternoon pushed over a try in the second half to defeat Mt. Allison intermediate squad in an exhibition football game played over the St. Dunstan's gridiron. The score was 5-0 as Gugley, P. W. C. fullback booted the wet slippery puck directly between the posts from a difficult angle. And it was the scoring hero of many a P.W.C. hockey battle that gave P.W.C. their victory Saturday as Nick Nicolle, taking a pass from Blanchard raced 35 yards through a broken field, with ten minutes to go, to cross the Mounties' line after the visitors had thrown back attempt after attempt of the home team in the previous stages of the game. The knockout was the payoff of a bitterly fought battle that saw a big crowd of fans brave the elements to witness the two squads in action. Play was evenly divided in the first half with first one squad and then the other having an advantage in territory but in the final session, P. W. C. showed a decided edge over their opponents' line after the Mounties' line for the only score of the encounter. Kicking off to the visitors, Prince of Wales forced play deep into Mt. A. territory. Three times in the first five minutes they were within five yards of a score but could not penetrate the stubborn defence being put up by the visitors. Mt. A. were forced to rouse for safety twice in the space of a few moments and their timely kicking took the ball out of danger on each occasion. Then, as the final half of the session began to tick off, Mt. A. suddenly went on the offensive. They hemmed the P. W. C. boys inside their 25-yard line for the last 15 minutes of the half but as the half ended they were still unable to cross the last white stripe. Maritime Hockey To Be Back On Pre-War Stride

TRURO, N.S., Oct. 28 — (CP) — Charles E. Campbell of Sydney, N.S., was elected president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association at the annual meeting here Saturday. Mr. Campbell, who has been vice-president of the M. A. H. A. the past two years, defeated the retiring president, Judge J. Elliott Hudson of Halifax, in a close vote. Judge Hudson also was defeated by B. N. Love of Amherst, N.S., as first vice-president and New Brunswick's Walter Lawlor of Charlottetown, well known star in the days of the Big Five of Maritime hockey, was named second vice-president representing Prince Edward Island and Neil McLean of Miramichi, N.S., was named president representing mainland Nova Scotia. Earene Connolly of Sydney was appointed secretary-registrar by an executive committee meeting, succeeding Earl Morison of Halifax. Discussion of winter was brief, but it was revealed that hockey will be back in its pre-war stride, and many advancements were looked for in the larger centres. It was decided at the meeting that the annual conventions would be held in future on the fourth Saturday in September. Maritime junior winners this season may strengthen their teams with three players from other clubs within the branch, and it was decided that the grant of \$1,500 to Maritime hockey will be continued. Much of the time of the meeting was taken up by claims from members for losses and discussion about lost trophies.
