REBEL CHIEF WAS OSCAR WHEELOCK BOSTON ABSCONDER

BOSTON, April 24.—Through photographs taken on the Mexican border, Oscar Creighton, a daring Mexican rebel leader, recently killed, was yesterday identified as Oscar M. Wheelock, the absconding auditor of the Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance Company of Boston.

As Captain Creighton, soldier of fortune, Wheelock during the past three months gained widespread fame on the Mexican border as a dare-devil rebel leader. His forte was the dynamiting of roadways and bridges, and he was marked as an extremely bold and dangerous man by the United States troops guarding the border. In a toothy attack against the federales he was shot down.

Two days ago photographs of Captain Creighton, the American soldier of fortune were published and at once recognized by scores of his friends as Oscar M. Wheelock, the one time chess and billiard expert of Boston and the embezzler of nearly \$10,000 from the bonding company, who left Boston in 1910.

In January, 1910, a shortage of \$9214.94 was discovered in Wheelock's account with the Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance Company. The matter did not become public until March of that year, when Wheelock had been testified implicitly as auditor and had been with the company ever since it was started.

Six months before he absconded, his wife, with whom he resided on School street, Somerville, died as a result of a runaway accident. At that time Wheelock was well known in Boston. He was an expert chess player and was a candidate for the amateur billiard championship of New England.

When he became an object of suspicion he fled the city, but before going, he married a Miss O'Malley of Butte, Mont., who was visiting in Boston.

Miss O'Malley was cousin to the Mayor of Butte at that time and was very well connected there. Wheelock secured a position in the National

al Packing Company at Butte under the name of Rodney H. Merrick, even securing a surety bond under that name from the very bonding company which had guaranteed him to the Boston bonding company he had robbed. He had known a man named Rodney H. Merrick, in Boston during his sporting days, and when the bonding company of Butte looked up Merrick in Boston they found him tall right. In January of this year he disappeared from Butte, following the discovery of a \$9000 shortage in his books at the National Packing Company's offices. In the mean time circulars asking for his apprehension had been sent broadcast by the Boston police, and at the present time Butte authorities have many such in all of the cities of the West.

A short time before he disappeared from Butte he shot himself, accidentally, it was said at the time, but it was afterward believed, and many people there are of the opinion now, that he attempted suicide. It is the opinion now of the friends who knew him well in Boston, that Wheelock, driven to the wall by his dishonesty and profligate manner of living, hunted by the police and afraid to kill himself after one unsuccessful attempt, entered the rebel ranks and invited death in leading forlorn hopes against the Mexican federales.

He was shot through the brain while heading a desperate and hopeless charge against the federal trenches. Not many weeks ago an effort was made to identify the daring Captain Creighton as a Harvard student. It proved vain.

ONLY FISH CAUGHT BY AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Fishing interests of New England are vitally affected by a ruling of the treasury department which has been sustained by the customs court in the case of the schooner Sarah G. Wharf, commanded by Captain F. J. Carter. The Hague tribunal gave American fishermen the right to operate in treaty waters with foreign labor, but some of the fishermen contended that fish caught by natives of Newfoundland for instance, could be brought into ports of the United States duty free by Americans. In sustaining the treasury department's ruling, the court defines an American fishery holding that fish caught in treaty waters by any other than an American owned or mastered outfit must pay duty as imports.

The government promised a subsidy of \$50,000 yearly, on condition that additional capital to the amount of \$750,000 should be raised in Lancashire, but the report says, this capital has not been signed.

Sherwood, of Ottawa, has awarded a trophy for the civilian section and Lt. Col. Woods, of Ottawa, one for the cadets.

JELLY BEANS FATAL TO BOY

WARWICK, R. I., April 23.—After eating some jelly beans which he purchased last night, Earl Johnson, aged 7, was taken suddenly ill and died early today in convulsions. Dr. J. Edward Duffy, who attended him, thought the illness was due to arsenic poisoning and reported the matter to the federal pure food authorities, who will make an analysis of the confections.

TRAPPED BY FIRE BOYS BURNED TO DEATH

TOPSFIELD, Mass., April 24.—Trapped in the centre of a forest fire in Boxford, near here, Frank Simmons, Jr., aged 15, of Boxford, and Albert Morgan of Beverly, were burned to death today. Their bodies were recovered later burned beyond recognition. Two others, Frank Simmons, father of the dead boy and William Simmons, a brother, were also trapped by the fire but broke through and escaped, although both are so seriously burned that they may not recover.

A brush fire started by George Frame, a farmer, living on the outskirts of the town got beyond his control and started the conflagration and before the blaze was finally controlled more than 100 acres, much of the valuable timber land was burned over. Frame's nearest neighbor, Frank Simmons, with his two sons and Albert Morgan of Beverly, helped to fight the fire and seemed to be getting the better of it, until, unnoticed by them, the blaze crept around and surrounded all but Frame.

NO COMPROMISE ON HOME RULE

LONDON, April 24.—The house of commons sat very late tonight in its discussion of the second clause of the parliament bill, which relates to the curtailment of the powers of the house of lords, and rejected numerous amendments seeking to exclude all sorts of measures from the operation of the bill.

The anti-home rule amendment, proposing to exclude "any bill to establish a separate parliament and executive for Ireland," which was moved by John B. Lansdale, unionist member for Mid Armagh, was defeated by a vote of 284 to 190. The division on this amendment showed no cross voting, but a few liberals, including Neil Primrose, the youngest son of the Earl of Rosebery, abstained from voting.

Both Premier Asquith and Home Secretary Churchill, during the course of the debate, reiterated the government's intention to proceed with the bill for the reform of the house of lords during the lifetime of the present parliament. Mr. Churchill explained that the fact that the parliament bill, altho it secured the pre-eminence of the house of commons, would still leave the house of lords the power of vexatious interference with liberal measures, within itself, and that the government would seek to reform the upper chamber.

In introducing the amendment to the bill intended to restrict the powers of the house of lords over legislation originating in the first chamber, Mr. Lansdale said that he desired to see the question of home rule removed together from the rest of the controversy over the reform of the house of lords. The government were at the mercy of the nationalists, whose object was to smash the constitution, he said, in order to dismember the empire by dividing Ireland into a number of independent states. James Ramsay MacDonald, socialist and labor member for Leicester, immediately took the floor in support of the nationalists, and contended that the laborites were wholeheartedly in favor of what was demanded by the nationalists, and that the projected "treaty of peace with Ireland" was a measure which the United States has been made possible by the promise of home rule for Ireland.

Premier Asquith in a few pointed sentences gave the house to understand early that the cabinet was unsympathetic to the opinion of the electors had returned them to power with the full knowledge that they would give Ireland a measure of home rule.

The opposition campaign of "dollar dictation" further emphasized the fact that the cabinet was unsympathetic to the opinion of the electors for Ireland, was an issue in the election. He repudiated the suggestion that there was any trickery or deceit on the part of the government, and left no doubt of his intention to abide by his pledge to introduce some sort of home rule bill.

Mr. Pirie withdrew his amendment and Mr. Lansdale's amendment was defeated, 284 to 190. John George Butcher, unionist member for York city, moved an amendment exempting from the operation of the home rule bill the continued existence of the crown's prerogatives.

In opposing this amendment, Sir Robert B. Finlay, the attorney general, said the security of the crown rested on the loyalty of the people, and it would be an evil day for the crown when it was demanded for existence upon the lords veto.

The Butcher amendment was then defeated 273 to 169. A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition, spoke in favor of the amendment, his remarks being a repetition of his oft-told argument. The government, he said, had hidden home rule in the background during the elections and now having surreptitiously attained power, they were going to force home rule down the throats of the people who he believed would be pleased to reject it as they did in 1885 and 1893.

CANADIAN STARS FOR CORONATION

OTTAWA, April 24.—Canadian athletes will undoubtedly be given a chance to compete in the Festival of the Empire games which are to be held in London this summer, as a result of negotiations which are now going on between the Amateur Athletic union and the Hon. Sidney Fisher, who has charge of Canada's affairs at the London festival.

Frank Nelson, an officer of the A. A. U., paid a special visit to Ottawa yesterday in order to secure a grant for such a team, and while the government did not pledge its support of the movement, it is understood from what can be gathered in official circles, that the wearers of the maple leaf on the cinder path will go as the Dominion's representatives. The A. A. U. has asked for a grant to defray the expense of ten men, eight of whom will be active participants, and this team will be composed of the very cream of this country's athletic stars. This squad will compete in the empire competition against teams representing Canada, Africa, Australia and the British Isles. The program, which is out of the ordinary for such athletic contests, comprises only a few of the usual field day list, and is given below, together with the probable Canadian candidates:

100 and 220 yard sprints—Frank Lukeman, Ottawa; Bobby Kerr, Hamilton; Frank Halbas, Toronto.

220 hurdles—Frank Lukeman, Ottawa.

880-yards—Arnold Knox, Toronto. One mile—Jack Tait, Toronto. Boxing heavyweight—Charlie Gage, Toronto.

Wrestling classes to be represented. Swimming—G. S. Johnstone, Ottawa and Geo. Hodgson, Montreal. There will be no appeal to the public for funds, and according to the A. A. U. the team will not go unless financed by the Dominion government.

PACIFIC LINER SINKS ON CHINESE COAST

TOKYO, April 24.—The Pacific mail steamship Asia, from Hong Kong for San Francisco, sunk off Finger Rock, South China. The passengers are reported rescued and the mails are saved.

The Asia struck Sunday morning while feeling her way cautiously through a thick fog in the direction of Shanghai. Her wireless signals of distress were picked up here by the steamer America, which was en route from Shanghai for Hong Kong. The latter vessel immediately replied: "We are coming to your assistance."

No further message was received by the America which pushed hard in the direction indicated in the call from the Asia.

The America arrived off Finger Rock at three o'clock yesterday afternoon, but owing to the fog, which continued heavy, was unable to discover the whereabouts of the distressed steamer. The America laid to until the weather cleared when she found that the Chinese vessel Shing Shi, of the Taku Steamship company, had gone to the aid of the Asia and rescued her passengers.

The latest report received by the agent of the mail steamship line at Yokohama said that the Asia was sunk, but it is believed the passengers with the mails were saved.

PRESIDENT FALCONER WANTS THE STANDARD RAISED

TORONTO, April 24.—If the strongly expressed desires of President Falconer, as laid before the senate of the University of Toronto, are carried out, the standard entrance to that institution of the junior matriculation will be raised to that of the senior matriculation—an important change.

It has been known that the president favored a higher standard of qualifications, but this is the first definite move in that direction. A statement issued under authority of the senate indicates sympathy with the president's views, but the senate will not take action until next fall.

WIFE IDENTIFIES MAN KILLED BY OFFICER

LAWRENCE, April 23.—The man who was shot by Special Police Officer Charles H. Newton, Jr., early Thursday morning was identified this morning as Kazimer Kockmont, 27, a Lithuanian weaver of 154 Prospect street.

The identification was made by Mrs. Kockmont, who went to the tomb, where the body had been placed. Kockmont, it is alleged, had attempted to burglarize Officer Newton's house and was shot after a hot pursuit and fight.

The distance from the Kockmont home to the place where the shooting occurred is between seven and eight miles.

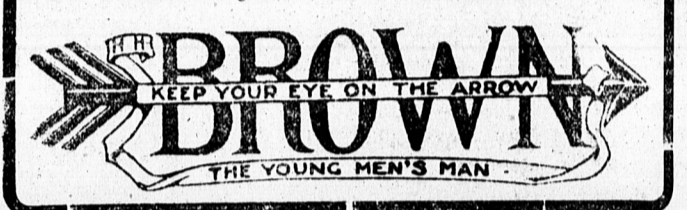

THE CHILDREN MARCHED OUT IN SAFETY

SYDNEY, April 24.—One of the most disastrous fires that has occurred in Glace Bay for some time, destroyed the new Aberdeen public school today. Apart from the loss of the building, there was no serious mishaps attending the fire, the children, of whom there were several hundred in the building at the time, being marched out quietly by their teachers. There were five departments in the building, all of which were occupied at the time. The fire originated in the basement near the foundation, the exact cause is still unknown. The building was badly burned, being almost entirely gutted inside and only the walls remain standing. The firemen were on the scene shortly after the fire started, but were unable to control the blaze, and devoted their exertions to the saving of the adjoining buildings. The loss will not be heavy, the building being worth about \$9,500, on which there was \$6,000 insurance.

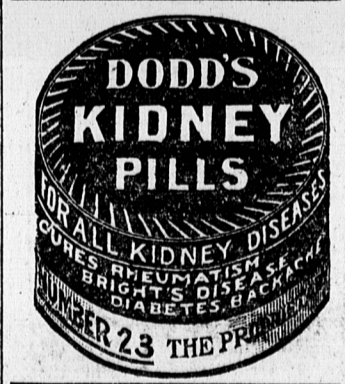
