By an oversight, which was unnoticed until too late to remedy in time for yesterday's issue, omission was made of any mention of the two fine recitations by Miss Ruby Rattray at the concert in the Opera House on Tuesday evening. Miss Rattray has rarely been heard to better advantage than on that occasion—her two readings—in appropriate Indian costume—winning for her the prolonged plaudits of a gratified audience, who emphatically demanded an encore.

Before a crowd of probably five thousand people the fleet distant runner of the F. X. College on Saturday at Sydney, captured the premier prize in the five mile Kennedy and Roger road race in the fast time of 28 minutes 52 seconds. There were sixty-one entries for the race but, as usual many dropped out. However 31 started at the crack of the pistol and 21 ran to the finish. The race was a most interesting event. Campbell, the winner, belongs to Red Indians, Richmond Co., and is at present living with his parents in Glouce Bay. He is a third year student in arts in St. F. X. College. There is practically no Maritime Province record for the five mile run. The world's record is 24 minutes 33 2/5 seconds, made by Arthur Shrub at Stanford Hill, London, on a grass track in 1904, on a quarter mile course. Prizes were awarded to those whose places ranked from first to sixteenth. Five finished outside the prize list. Nelson Kennedy, senior member of the firm of Kennedy and Roger who promoted the road race was born at Summerside and went to Sydney about eight years ago.

Those who are deploring the present unseasonable cold weather will find support from the predictions of the officials of the weather bureau, have to put up with the present condition of affairs for some time yet. On Tuesday night the bureau issued the following: Frost warnings have been issued for the Middle Atlantic States and eastern lower lake region, Western Colorado, East Wyoming, Utah and Northern Arizona and warnings of freezing temperature for Western Wyoming. The weather bureau officials say that there is no immediate prospect of any summer weather anywhere. A cold wave prevails most everywhere, and heavy frosts are reported to the weather bureau from Michigan and other states of the Lake region. The cold wave is particularly severe in the southwest, and is due, according to weather experts, to heavy rains in that part of the country. Forecaster Harry C. Frankfort, of the weather bureau, said last night "that the reason for the cold weather we have had during the past two or three months, is the high areas of pressure have moved eastward from the northern portion of the country almost continuously and these have caused the cold north winds that are only reason I can give for the cold weather areas. As to what makes these high areas keep up all this season is more than I can tell."

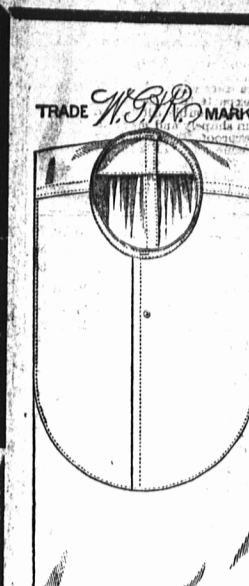
