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DEBATE ON SENATE REFORM ENDS IN HOUSE

Conference of Provincial and Federal Representatives Called to Amend B. N. A. Act

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, March 10.—At the conclusion of a prolonged debate upon the question of Senate Reform, the House of Commons last night gave to the Government a conclusive mandate to carry out the proposals set forth in the Speech from the Throne and to leave to a conference between Provincial and Federal representatives the whole problem of amending the British North America Act with respect to the Constitution and powers of the Senate and in other important particulars. The Government was upheld by a vote of 120 to 32. The division found the followers of the Ministry absolutely undivided, the Progressive and Independent members, with the exception of one solitary against

Looks As If Pact And Protocol Are Doomed

(Special to The Guardian) GENEVA, March 10.—By agreement outside the Council session, it has been arranged not to bring up the Geneva Protocol before Thursday morning, when Austen Chamberlain probably will explain the British viewpoint. Mr. Chamberlain already has received privately M. Briand and other statesmen, but it is explained that should not be attached to the fact. Upon Mr. Chamberlain's return trip he will stop at Paris with Premier Herriot. Hence it is morally certain that the Security Pact and the Protocol in their present forms are doomed.

NAVY LEAGUE HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING

President's Report Shows Organization Doing Active Work — Officers Re-elected

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island division of the Navy League was held yesterday afternoon in the Navy League building, with the President, Mr. J. O. Hyndman in the chair. Mr. Hyndman presenting his annual report, spoke as follows:

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

During the past year the Prince Edward Island Division of the Navy League of Canada has been engaged in various activities, but these may not have been apparent to or appreciated by those not in close touch or familiar with the aims and purposes of our organization. In this regard it may be desirable to quote from the Official Publication, issued by Dominion Headquarters, entitled "The Navy League of Canada—What It Stands For."

The aims of the Navy League are: 1. To make all our people understand our dependence on the Sea as a nation. 2. To have Canadian trade carried in Canadian ships, manned by Canadian Seamen. 3. To guard our Seamen and their dependents from destitution. 4. To have an adequate naval defence for Canadian commerce.

The Navy League of Canada was founded during the stress of war in 1917. It sprang into being in response to a demand throughout the country that we, in this part of the Empire, should bear our share with the other Dominions in helping the men who "kept watch and ward" on the sea. It is gratifying to state that the experience of the League then showed the great heart of our people and their loyalty to the flag. Large sums were freely given, and at least a million and a half dollars went towards the men who "kept watch and ward" on the sea. The Imperial Navy, while the provision was made for our own seamen and their dependents who suffered from enemy submarines.

Happily those days are ended and the hope of the League is they will never return. It cannot be said too strongly and often that the League is opposed to war and all the terrible tragedy it entails. In no sense does the League sympathize with militarism. The very opposite; all its influence is cast on the side of peace and the truth is, that its chief purpose is to promote a condition that will make for more lasting security throughout the world.
