"One started to take off his boots," one testified, "but I guess when he saw the mud he did not want to dirty his shoes. He put them on again and when we begged them to help Albert they told us to go to... and hurried away."

Bishop Ingram Blamed for Migration Speech

HIS REMARKS AT TORONTO CONCERNING LOYALTY, RILES LONDON EDITOR, WHO FORECASTS TROUBLE

LONDON, Aug. 24.—In an editorial headed "A Bishop Let Loose," the Western Gazette criticizes the Bishop of London for a speech on migration which his Lordship made in Toronto last week and which the Gazette refers to as "a little disquieting."
"Bishop Winnington-Ingram," the Gazette says, "is reported as having asked in public: Can we expect the same loyalty to British ideals from Gallician, Poles and God knows who else who are populating Canada, and who do not know a word of English?"
The Gazette refers to this as a "rather freckled inquiry," and expresses the hope that "His Lordship's oratory on his trip will only occasion flights."
Continuing the Gazette says: "The Bishop of London should cease to regard himself as a missionary of Empire and be content to remember that it is no part of Divine Providence that humanity should speak the English language

Prominent Business Man Drowned

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 26.—Hugh G. Fraser, President of the Maritime Realty Company, Halifax, was drowned yesterday while swimming at Timberlea, a small summer resort several miles from the city.
