VERSAILLES, France, March 31.—(AP)—Two German saboteurs, Roger Millon, members of a murder-for-profit ring whose victims included a British pilot, were sentenced to death on the guillotine today. Jean Blanc, convicted of supplying money for the ring which was based on the island of Jersey, was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment, and Colette Tricot, 27-year-old woman charged with receiving the ring's stolen goods, was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment.

Pruning Apple Trees

Switzerland Imports Canadian Wheat

Imports into Switzerland from Canada amounted to 117,213 metric tons valued at \$2,091,215 francs in 1938 as compared with 63,097 metric tons valued at \$2,312,118 francs the previous year. (One Swiss franc equals 2.04 pounds).

Argentina's Potato Crop

The present potato crop has been harvested in Argentina and the aggregate volume of demand is not likely to differ greatly from the aggregate volume of supply. 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Scout News and Notices

What about Patrol Corners? Has each patrol in your troop a small room, or corner of the troop room, screened off from the remainder? This room or corner, known as a Patrol corner, is sacred to the Patrol using it.

Another compass game—Counting out. Form a circle with the North point to South and try to stand in centre. Others march around centre. It calls Halt! Indicates someone in circle and starts to count. He can count ten before he is indicated has then his correct compass point, he can change places.

A very useful piece of equipment for the troop room, is a sand tray or sand table. This is a shallow box, or the lid of a box with a rim a few inches high, half filled with slightly dampened sand. A sand table is merely a table possibly six feet long and four feet wide, having a rim about four inches high strongly nailed to the edges and ends. Each patrol might have its own sand tray, and the troop a sand table. The bottom of the sand table should be covered with blue, you can then show rivers, lakes and streams by scraping away the sand. Mark the sides and ends with a yardstick and inches. Do not use your scale and mark it on the table. One inch to twenty-five yards is a good scale. On this scale a table six feet long and four feet wide would represent a piece of country 1800 yards long and 800 yards wide. On the same scale, a sand tray one foot square, would represent ground 800 yards by 800 yards. A scaled ruler is necessary. The table should be marked in feet in the practice of map reading and sketching for planning the layout of your next camp, for demonstrating plays in hockey and football. All the sections of the troop should be in the sand table. The hills are made of the sand itself, a match and bit of cardboard make a signpost, matches and black thread make telegraph poles and black string make a plough. Suppose you have planned to camp on a certain place, go to see the site, make a rough sketch of it, giving distances, nature of ground, shape, water supply, trees etc. Reproduce this sketch on your sand table. Then by means of paper tents, markers, etc., you can plan your camp, selecting the patrol sites, placing the kitchen, cookhouse, wash places, latrines, etc. You will not only have the fun of doing this, but you will receive instruction and practice in mapping and you will save a lot of time when your troop has arrived on the camp site.

The Patrol Leader's Training Course starts on Monday at 7:15 p. m. in St. Paul's Parish Hall. All City Troops are urged to have their Patrol Leaders and Second attend. Will Scoutmasters, who have not already done so, notify Mr. Ralph Johnson, at Provincial Headquarters, as to the number of boys of their troop, intending to take the course.

As some Patrol Leaders from out of town troops are coming in for the Patrol Leader's Training Course, each Scoutmaster is asked to have a good train of boys on the incoming train on Monday, if possible. Don't forget your note book and pencil. GRET WOLF. A BIT EXCITED, TOO!
