Dick Hughes will play cover point for the Abbies this evening and the Abbies will thus have an improved line up.

The Fourth Regiment Band will be in attendance at the big hockey match between the Abbies and Crystals at the Arena to-night.

A close and exciting game of hockey took place in the S. D. C. rink between the Collegian Mohawk and Prefect teams. The latter were victorious, defeating their rivals by a score of two to one. Bradford McNeill made a satisfactory referee while W. McNeill, as judge of play, fulfilled his duties in a creditable manner.

The selection of a military contingent from this Province to the Coronation is now being made. Officers and men are to have their passages paid going and returning, including meals on the voyage. In addition the officers are allowed \$1.50 and the men 75 cents per day. It is not yet known who will command the provincial contingent.

The case of Alfred A. Macdonald vs. John W. McDonald, an action for trespass, was continued yesterday in the Supreme Court. The case was concluded late in the afternoon, the jury returning a verdict for plaintiff, assessing damages at \$25.00. As this is the last case on the docket, Court then adjourned until Monday, February 13th, at 11 a. m., when arguments and motions will be heard.

The Methodist ministers of St. John met recently and talked over matters of importance in connection with the Methodist social union now being formed. Those present were Revs. J. Heaney, Dr. Plenders, G. A. Ross, W. W. Brewer, W. F. Gaetz, William Lawson, H. Wigle and Dr. Wilson. Reference was made to the moral and social reform work in the city, and an interesting address was given by Mr. Wigle who drew some points of contrast between the Methodism of the east and west. A letter was read from Rev. George Steele, D. D., requesting the ministers to give him their sympathy and support his work in connection with the superannuated fund. (All the clergymen mentioned above are well known in this city and Province.)

MEN'S POCKETS SAFE WHEN WOMEN GET VOTE.

If a man wants to throw his trousers over the back of a chair when he goes to bed at night and lie down with the peaceful consciousness that in the morning the pockets will be right side in and car fare undisturbed, let him vote for woman suffrage. Beatrice Forbes-Robertson, the English actress-suffragette, says that "votes for women" will solve this perplexing problem for pondering husbands.

This new argument in favor of equal suffrage nearly inaugurated a stampede toward "the cause" on the part of the thousands of men who made up half of the big audience that listened to the actress in Old Fellows' Temple, Broad and Cherry Sts., in Philadelphia.

It was in the open discussion which followed the lecture that this question was unfolded:

"How would woman suffrage prevent a wife from taking money from her husband's pockets?"

As quick as a flash came back the answer, "She wouldn't need to take money, she would have it herself!"

And yet, Beatrice Forbes-Robertson says, the enfranchisement of woman will not hasten the millennium.

"They say that suffrage will unsex the women," she declared, in answer to arguments of the antis, whom she flayed right and left. "I should like to see a woman with a big picture off my hat"—she wore a big picture hat, too, with a half dozen long pins— "to an unsexed woman, should you think a woman exist. But there isn't such a thing. If there were, she would be travelling with Barnum & Bailey."

The gloved hands of the thousand women in the audience went up and down, Miss Forbes-Robertson said that in England men are less chivalrous to the woman than they are in America.

"Now, don't smile, men, I didn't mean that for a compliment," she said. "Chivalry toward women means with you, I am strong; you are weak. They say we shouldn't vote because we can't fight. But warfare is nothing to grab. In early times tribes went to war and grabbed the women of other tribes. Then the man who grabbed would exhibit his women as his property. The term 'lady' began as an exhibit of her husband's property."
