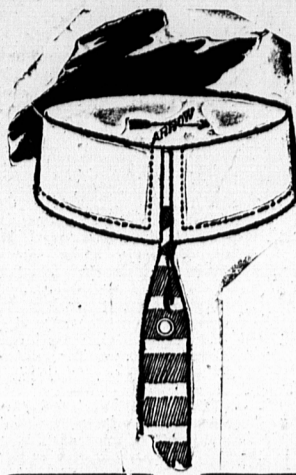

IN MEMORIAM.

At his residence, Wood Islands North, on April 14, 1911, there passed to his eternal reward, an aged Patriarch, in the person of Hector McMillan, Presbyterian elder, at the advanced age of 89 years.
