MONTREAL, June 16—(CP)—Leaders in the mining and industrial sections on the stock exchange gave a moderate rallying performance today. Consolidated Smelters, in metals, jumped 2 1-2 points and International Nickel was a fractional gainer. Hudson Bay Mining moved back a point. National Steel Car, Massey-Harris and Algoma Steel were stand outs among firmer industrials. Canada Cement was shaved a fraction. Elsewhere in the trading, prices were irregular. In fuels, Imperial Oil slipped and in rails and carriers, C.P.R. lost an early advance and Canada Steamship was behind throughout the session. Montreal Power was unsteady, dropping a fractional gain in late transactions. Winnipeg Electric "A" was also down. Canadian Cottons preferred and National Breweries preferred edged forward along with Oxide. Total sales: 7,400 shares; Industrials 2,600; Mines, 4,800.

CURRENCIES

NEW YORK, June 16—(CP)—The pound sterling gained 1 1/4 cent to \$4.04 and the Canadian dollar 5-16 to a discount of 11 1/2 cents in foreign exchange dealings. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.99-9.91 per cent discount.) Foreign exchange traders declined to give even a nominal valuation on the German mark and the Italian lira, on the heels of the United States treasury order Saturday "freezing" Axis funds here. Other currencies, which were slightly higher were the Shanghai dollar at 5.59 cents and the Argentine free peso at 23.77 cents. The Portuguese mired was up a shade to 402 cents "subject to licence," on the assumption authorities would later permit licences for payments to that country.

TORONTO, June 16—(CP)—While the gold shares lagged other listings of the Toronto stock exchange moved forward to register moderate gains today. Volume was heavier than the recent average at 180,000 shares. The depressed note in the gold share trade carried Kerr-Addison back 15 cents to 4.20, Kerr Lake 11 cents to 30 and Lamaque 20 cents to 4.55 while losses of 3 to 5 cents were netted by Moneta, Pamour and San Antonio. McIntyre was up 1-2 to 47 1-2 for broken lots and the close was up a few cents for Anor, Buffalo, Ankerite, Mad en and Omega. A gain of 1 5-8 was registered by Smelters in broken lot trades, Nickel added a minor fraction and moderate gains were held by Falconbridge, Sleep Rock, Wals-Ambler and Pend Oreille. The bid for Chromium was dropped on the news that the company proposed a revision of the capital set-up. Noranda

NEW YORK, June 16—(AP)—The ranks of stock market skeptics were pretty well crowded today and, while most exhibited no great selling urgency, buying abstemiousness was pronounced. Most Canadian issues were unchanged with a few stocks fractions lower. International Nickel and Walkers lost 1-4 point each and Imperial Oil 1-8. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks slipped 1 of a point at 41.3, its third successive downturn after the lengthy recovery swing. Dealings were negligible, transfers of 338,130 shares compared with 443,320 Friday. It was the lowest turnover for a full day since June 6. U.S. Steel and Bethlehem finished up 1-8 of a point each as this week's estimated mill production was raised 4 of a point to 99 per cent of capacity. Prominent gainers included American Can and Foundry common and pfd, senior issues of U. S. Distributing and Certain-Teed. On the losing side were, Westinghouse, Santa Fe, Great Northern, General Motors, U.S. Rubber,
