ARMY TRANSPORT SERVICE.

The natural impatience of the British public over a war which now bids fair to be more prolonged than was at first expected gives rise to some criticism of the delay in the embarkation of troops and the employment of slow transports.

Some of our American exchanges join in echoing these complaints, while others applaud the rapidity and precision with which an army corps has been transported from the British Islands to South Africa.

Beyond question the praise is more timely and appropriate than the blame.

Not all the transports were fast steamers, nor was it possible they should be, when a sudden emergency demanded that 300,000 tons of steam craft should be at once secured for the transport service.

All, or nearly all of these 100 or more vessels were employed in the peaceful business of commerce when the war broke out.

They had to be bargained for, their trading charters cancelled, and many of them refitted for the work they were to undertake.

Many of the steamers had to be brought from comparatively distant ports before they could be made ready to take troops on board.

In view of all these exigencies the results show remarkable energy and promptness in making ready the expedition to South Africa.

As is pointed out by the Toronto Globe, Kruger's ultimatum was issued on October 10th and on November 17th, thirty eight days after the outbreak of the war, 16,000 troops had been landed in South Africa, though the seat of war is 6,000 miles distant from the shores of England.

In fact the first troops sailed within ten days of Kruger's ultimatum.

How was it with the United States expedition to Cuba? The ultimatum was submitted to Spain on April 20, 1898, and it was not till June 21—two months later,—that the first troops were landed in Cuba, though Santiago is within three day's sail of Jacksonville.

Britain was sending out troops to Africa within ten days after Kruger's ultimatum, as we have said, but it was not until the 54th day after the like crisis in the trouble with Spain that the first United States troops sailed for Cuba.

The comparison serves to show not the unreadiness, but the surprising readiness, of Britain in the present emergency.

All previous records have been broken in the size of the army thus transported beyond the seas, the distance the troops have been conveyed, the early date at which they set out, and the smoothness with which the entire enterprise has been carried out.

No doubt if only the fastest liners of the world had been engaged as transports, the troops, or a portion of them, might have been landed in Africa more quickly, but the transport service seems to have done its work as it is with a singular exemption from accident and disaster.

The best we can hope for is that when our victor-

our troops return at the close of the war they may be brought back to the shores of England with equal speed, comfort and safety.

Fire Protection in Cities.

American cities lead the world in the number of paid firemen, while British cities bring up the rear, and besides, even in exceptional instances, fall far below the per capita fire protection expenditures in other European cities.

As to the same, size. In some British cities or towns, such as Liverpool, Bristol, Blomley, Norwich, and Cardiff, the work of extinguishing fires is in the hands of the police, of whom a certain number are trained to do the work of firemen.

London's Metropolitan fire brigade shows a roll of about 800 men—a number which Berlin, with about one-quarter of the population, about equals, and Paris doubtless. Glasgow, with a population of 800,000 has only 100 firemen; Leeds, 33 for 600,000 people, and Sheffield 23 for 350,000 persons.

As to the expenditures, Glasgow and Liverpool spend on their fire department about \$75,000—ten cents per capita—annually, while Edinburgh, Dublin, Belfast and Salford are equally liberal in proportion to their population.

London's yearly expenditure is about \$950,000 something like twenty cents per capita, while Sheffield spends less than \$10,000 a year; Norwich, with a population of 100,000 only \$750; Preston, with 118,000 people, only \$1,500; and Leeds, less than \$5,000 to protect nearly half a million people and its many big factories.—Canadian Contract Record.

FOR COAL SUPPLY.

The German Government Experimenting With Peat and Other Fuel.

BREMEN, Nov. 17.—Count Wilhelm von Bismarck Schenhausen, superior president of the province of East Prussia, in speaking before a trades union yesterday declared that the only hope of bettering industrial conditions in East Prussia lay in establishing the manufactures of the province on an independent basis.

Under present conditions, he said, a stoppage of the German coal supplies would deliver the industries, banded hand and foot, to the English and American coal companies.

The government, he said, were experimenting with peat and other fuels, the use of which, if practicable, would make the manufacturer independent of the external fuel supply.
