**SARCASTIC REPLY TO COL. ROOSEVELT**

PARIS, May 16.—Mr. Theodore Roosevelt's statements relative to his exploration trip in South America, and more particularly his criticism of Mr. Henry Savage Landor's account of a trip in the same region, have aroused keen interest here.

Mr. Landor is well known in Paris, and his experience in Thibet made him highly popular. Only a few weeks ago he gave a lecture in the Sorbonne before an immense gathering, which included the leading scientists of France, about his discoveries in the region traversed three years later by Mr. Roosevelt.

The Excelsior publishes an interview with Mr. Landor, whom it styles the bravest, most famous and most conscientious of living explorers on Mr. Roosevelt's intention to challenge before the Royal Geographical Society of London some of Mr. Landor's declarations.

"Mr. Roosevelt," the explorer is reported to have said, "is all right as a politician, but as an explorer he awakes my pity. According to the newspapers, he intends to controvert the accuracy of some of my statements."

MR. ROOSEVELT'S "PLEASURE TRIP."

"But I think before starting he would do well to explore afoot or on horseback the ground I covered instead of making, as he has been making, a sort of pleasure trip in a steam launch.

"He challenges my statements, does he? Well I note that so far he has merely copied with curious fidelity, the salient incidents of my journey.

"He took the same length of time to traverse the different stages. He follows my descriptions of the country word for word, and, oddly enough, caught the same illness, even suffering from an injury to the same leg. Such things often happen to Tartaric explorers who read up the works of their predecessors.

"I have no comments to make on Mr. Roosevelt's book, which he says will be most scientific, but his pretensions make me laugh, and I think every one with a little common sense will laugh with me.

DISCOVERER OF AFRICA  
"The public knows only too well

his glorious discovery of Africa, and the great risks he ran in exploring the railway line from Mombassa to Lake Victoria Nyanza. Surely no-body can have forgotten his voyage across that lake in a pleasant steamer, fitted with every modern convenience.

"To omit nothing, I will only mention the perils he braved in descending the Nile, again in a magnificent steamer, and closing his marvellous journey by the discovery of Egypt.

"I see that in Brazil he has discovered a river called 'Doubt.' I think the name happily chosen. It might fittingly be replied not only to the river but to Mr. Roosevelt's entire journey in Brazil.

Mr. Landor is on the point of going to Italy for a rest.

The Excelsior correspondent asked him, "Are you going to discover Italy?"

"Oh, replied Mr. Landor, 'I leave that work to Mr. Roosevelt!'"

**FRENCH FLYING TRAIN ATTRACTING ATTENTION IN LONDON**

LONDON, May 14.—M. Bachelet's flying train continues to attract attention. M. Bachelet yesterday wound up a demonstration of his invention by lifting a boy into the air in his model passenger car. The boy, five years old, weighing forty-two pounds, sat in a wicker chair; M. Bachelet switched on the current, and car, chair and boy rose from the coils and remained supported in the air in Mahomet coffin-like effect.

The little passenger jumped when he suddenly jerked upwards, but quickly broke into smiles, and obviously enjoyed his experience as the first passenger on a flying train. The model car weighs eighteen pounds, so that the total weight lifted was sixty pounds.

**RUSSIAN MILITARY AVIATOR KILLED.**

SEBASTOPOL, Russia, May 16.—The military aviator Semichukra, fell from an aeroplane during a flight yesterday and was killed.

**LONG DISTANCE WALKER REACHES ST. JOHN.**

ST. JOHN, May 16.—Completing a tramp of about 4,000 miles, W. H. Adams, of Vancouver, arrived in the city yesterday and registered at the Victoria. He walked every mile of the way, and wins a stake of \$50,000 according to his story told a reporter last evening. He is sixty-six years of age, but tough as hickory and arrived here, as he says, in the pink of health. He looks very hale and hearty for his age. A man of thirty-five started out on the trip with him but only got as far as Winnipeg, here he gave out and turned back to his home.

Mr. Adams had till August 31st to complete his tramp across the continent and therefore wins by a good margin. He was one year and twelve days on the trip, having left Vancouver on May 1st, of last year. It is about 3,500 miles by rail from Vancouver to St. John, but Mr. Adams says that by the route he followed which was mapped out before he left, the distance is 4,000.

Adams is a timber ranger—one of the best in the redwoods of British Columbia. The Vancouver Athletic Association, which includes many millionaires, and is composed almost exclusively of wealthy men, sent for him about a year ago and made a singular offer. He and the younger man, whose name is James Jimson, were to start from Vancouver on May 31, 1913, and must arrive in St. John, not later than August 31, 1914, walking every step of the way—approximately 3,500 miles. The one reaching the goal first was to receive \$50,000—which was quite a bit of change, even for the exertion of tramping across the continent. Both, of course, were expert pedestrians, and it was a contest of the young against the old.

**EIGHTEEN COUNTRIES IN MISSIONARY CONFERENCE**

CLIFTON SPRINGS, N. Y., May 16.—The opening session of the thirty-first conference of the International Missionary Union was held here last night. Eighteen countries are represented, India has the largest representation with forty-two, who now are or have been engaged in missionary work in that country. The central theme throughout the week's conference will be: "The Gospel of the Prince of Peace in a World in Revolution."
