LONDON, June 8.—(A P.)—The Daily Mail said today that Chiaramonte Bordonaro, Italian Ambassador to London, suffered a sudden heart attack last night and was removed to a nursing home in serious condition.

The doctors were anxious concerning his condition, the newspaper said. He was stricken while dressing for dinner at the hotel where he was staying here.

Antonio Chiaramonte Bordonaro has been Italian Ambassador in London since 1927. He is 55 years old.

U. S. Senate Cut Out Reduction

WASHINGTON, June 8.—By a 63 to 14 vote the United States Senate late today tossed out of the National Economy Bill all provisions for curtailing expenditures for war veterans.

The action shot a \$48,000,000 hole in the measure and cut its total estimated saving to \$186,000,000. The exemption of salaries below \$1,000 from pay cuts had reduced the savings \$4,000,000.

As reported to the Senate by its bi-partisan economy committee, the bill carried a saving of \$238,000,000 and was described as necessary to help the new tax bill balance the budget.

In place of the seven sections tightening the requirements for cash allowances and institutional care, the Senate like the House, retained only a paragraph providing for a joint congressional committee to consider veterans' legislation and report January 1 as to possible changes.

De Valera Willing To Make Sacrifices

LONDON, June 8.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Morning Post today published a despatch from Dublin saying President Eamon De Valera's attitude at yesterday's conference with J. H. Thomas, British Dominions Secretary, and Lord Hailsam, Secretary for War, indicated he wished to negotiate a new Anglo-Irish Treaty amending that of 1921.

The newspaper said it understood Mr. De Valera introduced the subject of Ireland's partition and declared he was willing to make considerable sacrifices to achieve political unity of Northern Ireland with the Free State.

It added the cautious attitude of Mr. Thomas and Lord Hailsam gave the President the impression their object was to hear what he had to say and to report back to the British cabinet.

The newspaper did not indicate the source of its information.
