WHEAT MARKET NOW FEVERISH

Jumped Four and a Half Cents on Report That Rust Had Struck In.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6—(Special)—The wheat market yesterday was the most sensational for many months and just before its close jumped 4 1/2 cents.

For whatever cause, runaway markets were the order of the day. There were further rust stories but none of consequence.

LOUIS RIEL'S SON DIED IN WINNIPEG

Last of Immediate Family of Famous Rebel Has Passed Away.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 5.—The last of the immediate family of Louis Riel, the famous rebel leader, passed out today, when his only remaining son, Jean Louis Riel, died at St. Boniface Hospital of a complication of diseases.

Jean Louis Riel was born in Montana, thirty-six years ago, during his father's residence there, following the first rebellion. He was well educated and finally took up the profession of a civil engineer.

CAUGHT AFTER 5 MILE WALK

Father's Busy on Telephone and Wedding Bells Fail to Ring.

LOCK HAVEN, Pa., Aug. 5.—After escaping the watchful eye of her paternal rent and walking with her lover from Madisonburg to this city, twenty-five miles by the highway, Miss Edna Lambert, a pretty, eighteen-year-old girl, fell into the hands of the police.

Greenoble and Miss Lambert intended to take the train here for Buffalo, where the wedding was to take place. Mr. Lambert, missing his daughter, had a hint what her game was and telephoned to the police.

The pair left Madisonburg at 8 o'clock Saturday evening and limped into Lock Haven at 1.30 o'clock this morning.

It took no Sherlock Holmes to tell that they were strangers in town, and as the police were instructed to pick up the first loveless looking pair of strangers they saw, Greenoble and his bride-to-be were soon landed in the station house.

Papa Lambert came over on the next train. Edna promised to be good, but of course with a mental reservation, and Lambert consented so far that he requested that Greenoble be released. The three returned to Madisonburg.

PARTY FIGHT IN SASKATCHEWAN

Is Waxing Hot, Premier Scott Sued For Libel and Leader Threatened.

REGINA, Aug. 6—(Special)—Following a reiteration by Premier Scott of his charges of grafting against Laird the Conservative candidate for this city, in which defiance is hurled at the latter gentleman and most explicit charges made, Mr. Laird has entered a civil action against Scott for \$2,500 damages.

A criminal action is also threatened against the editor of the Leader.

TWO DEATHS IN FERNIE DISASTER

One Lifeless Body Found In Mine Late Last Night—Another Not Yet Recovered.

FERNIE, B. C., Aug. 5.—After seven hours of battle against death and entertaining every hope of ultimate delivery, the twenty-four men entombed in Coal Creek mine were rescued at 3.15 this afternoon by the balance of the mine employees. From 3.15 this afternoon the rescue half past eight until three this afternoon the rescue party worked incessantly clearing away the tons of debris which choked the entrance to the mine.

At the mouth of the shaft, 2,800 feet above, was gathered an immense crowd. To the best belief of those outside, in the chamber in which the men were entombed, all air was shut off, and no hope was entertained toward the finding of the men alive.

DAUGHTER OF LORD MINTO CAN MILK

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 5.—Lady Violet Elliott, daughter of Lord Minto, now visiting at Government House, gave a unique demonstration yesterday of her ability to take a useful place on the farm.

Lady Violet promptly showed him that she could. The cow was milked the milk put through the cooling process, then bottled by the daughter of India's viceroy.

FERNIE AFRAID OF PESTILANCE

Sanitary Conditions Very Bad, Smallpox is Spreading, and Passengers Are Warned Not to Debar There.

FERNIE, B. C., Aug. 6—(Special)—Pestilence is now feared in Fernie and Cranbrook, for there is an entire lack of sufficient sanitation in both places.

Especially in Cranbrook is the situation very serious, for two thousand women and children refugees are crowded very closely and the weather is exceedingly hot.

Two new cases of smallpox developed in Fernie last night, and the greatest care is being taken to isolate them.

SUPREME COURT HELD YESTERDAY

Vice Chancellor Gives Judgment in a Number of Chancery Cases.

The vice Chancellor Mr. Justice Fitzgerald delivered judgment in the following cases yesterday morning: Audrey Mutch vs. William Moffatt. In this case there was a demurrer to the whole bill on the ground that the Plaintiff had not sufficiently stated the case entitling him to the equitable relief of the court.

SENTENCE OF DEATH BEEN COMMUTED

Englishman at Prince Albert Will Spend Remainder of His Life in Jail.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—At yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet Council, the sentence of death passed upon an Englishman named Barette, of Prince Albert, for the murder of his stepson last spring, was commuted to life imprisonment.

BISHOPS ASKED ABOUT LICENSE

Say Canada's Drink Bill Per Head is But One Quarter of Britain's.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 6—(Special)—The Church of England Temperance Society asked an opinion on the drink question from some colonial bishops at the Pan Anglican Congress.

Australian bishops think the licensing system defective and there is much to learn in the Commonwealth from unfavorable comparison with the Dominion.

The Canadian bishops point out that the drink bill of Canada is only one quarter per head of what it is in Great Britain.

NEW ZEALAND PROHIBITS ALL

Prison Made Goods From Entering Her Ports and So Notifies Canada.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6—(Special)—The Trade and Commerce department has received a cable from the New Zealand Government announcing that the importation of prison-made goods into New Zealand is now absolutely prohibited.

Hitherto there has been a surtax of 20 per cent and valorem duty on all imports.

BIG JUMP IN THE PRICE OF WHEAT

Frantic Efforts Made by The Shorts to Cover Their Contracts.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The largest public buying movement which has taken place in the local wheat market this season, occurred today, and the price jumped 2 1/2 cents per bushel under heavy buying orders in which the shorts participated in a frantic effort to cover their contracts.

TO ROB BAND GOLD MINES

LONDON, Aug. 5.—A despatch from Pietermaritzburg reports the discovery of a gigantic sprang to rob the Rand Gold Mines of enormous sums. Gold to the amount of \$100,000 has been stolen this year, and many thousands of dollars worth of gold is bound to create a popular indignation which may have far reaching results in the near future.

WHIRL OF DEATH WAS HIS FINISH

Coshocton, O., Aug. 5.—William Wilson was instantly killed in a theatre here recently when he tried a new kind of "Loop the loop," known as the "Whirl of death" on a bicycle.

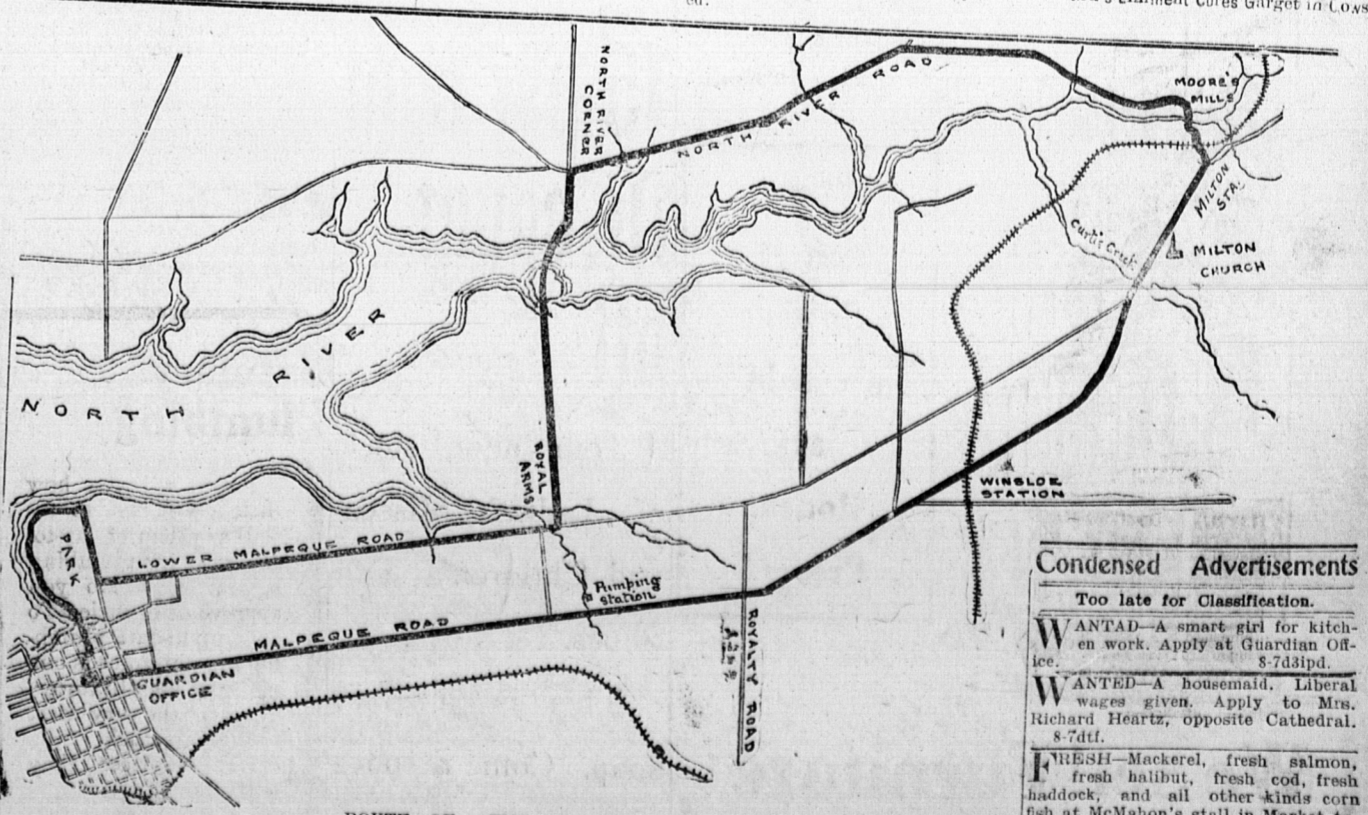
PRINCE RUPERT WILL BE HELD

VICTORIA, Aug. 5.—By mutual arrangement between the G. T. P. and the provincial government, it has been agreed not to put any lots up for sale at Prince Rupert until spring of next year, probably May.

This will give an opportunity to have all arrangements carried out looking to the proper laying out of the city, and agreements as to sale of lots, which it now being arranged between the government and the company.

It is likely that considerable municipal work will be done jointly by the company and the government before lots are sold, such as laying water-pipes, drainage, etc.
