Then came the thought that she had done it purposely. I hated myself for allowing it to enter my mind, but it persisted.

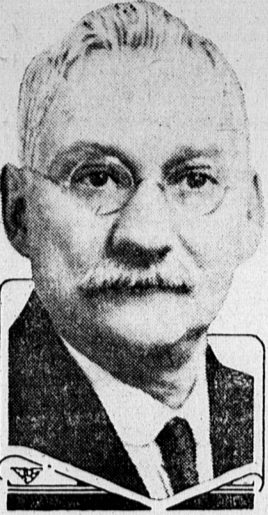

Hints for the Motorist

CAR WON'T CLIMB HILLS

B. J. E. writes: My car runs well on the level, but has no power on hills. The engine has just been overhauled, new piston-rings and wrist pins having been installed, bearings taken up ignition system gone over. What is the cause of this low hill-climbing ability?

Answer: Very likely one or more of these defects: Faulty compression, due to poor ring fitting or to the rings not having worn in; excessive stiffness of the mechanical parts, occasioned by overtight bearings or crudeness of the rig fit causing great mechanical friction or something wrong with carburation, which prevents you from obtaining a powerful fuel mixture of low speeds. This may be faulty carburetor adjustment or some defect in the fuel feed. If all the cylinders do not have good, springy compression, with the plugs taken out, your loss of climbing power is readily accounted for. There is always a possibility of incorrect ignition and valve timing, after an overhauling. Your brakes do not drag, do they?

EXCESSIVE CRANK CASE DILUTION

C. A. writes: Gasoline leaks into the crank-case of my engine to such an extent that the oil is always full of it, and I am really afraid to run the car, for fear of lubrication trouble. A year ago, I had the cylinders reground and new rings fitted. What do you advise doing?

Answer: Badly fitting pistons alone can hardly account for such an excessive case of oil dilution as this. Are you sure that your vacuum unstead tank is not out of order. Sometimes because of defective action of its suction valve, raw gasoline is allowed to enter the manifold, as long as the engine is running, and this, of course, thins the oil very rapidly. You better have your vacuum system thoroughly tested out. If all the gasoline which gets into the crank case from the mixture normally supplied by the carburetor, it would seem that you must be using very low grade fuel, that this mixture must be extremely overrich that the engine must be overcooled and that the pistons should expect you to experience very serious overheating troubles, with pistons in any such condition and that your power would be very low.

SPARK INTENSIFIER QUESTIONS

E. B. asks: Is the use of spark-intensifiers, in connection with the spark-plugs, injurious to the coils or any other part of the equipment? Is it of assistance in starting a cold engine?

Answer: It is not injurious to the coils, as each coil is fitted with a safety spark-gap to protect it from the effects arising from increasing the discharge resistance of its secondary circuit. The intensifier has no effect upon other parts of the equipment. In the case of a sooted or oil-fouled spark-plug, the intensifier will often cause a spark to pass, no spark will occur. The intensifier might help in starting a cold engine. Dirty plugs indicate waste of gasoline or oil and it is much better practice to remove the cause of plug fouling than to cover up the evil by the use of intensifiers.

No Trace Of Balloonists

Naval Officials Still Have Hope of Rescuing Missing Men

PENSACOLA, Fla., March 28—Continued search today by the squadrons of airplanes, flying boats, dirigibles and eagle boats, failed to find any trace of the missing United States naval balloon in command of chief quartermaster G. F. Wilkinson carrying four students which left the naval air station here Tuesday night and was last reported over the Gulf twenty miles off St. Andrews' Bay. Naval officials, however, have not given up hope of rescuing the missing men.

In the balloon with Wilkinson, whose home is in Houston, Texas, were Russell V. Eland, of Belleville, Illinois, Edward L. Kershaw of Rayne, La., John O. Elder, of Lebanon, N. Y., and William Tre-

tery, of Salem, Mass.

Despite today's disappointment, naval officials have no intention of surrendering hope and the search is being held tonight and will be carried on again tomorrow, the circle ever widening.

The balloon in which the five men left there at five o'clock Tuesday afternoon was a 5,000 cubic foot craft. Besides the men and ballast, two pigeons were carried. One of these returned to the air station at 9.39 o'clock yesterday morning with a message which had been started nearly 24 hours before. The second pigeon returned that afternoon it, too, had been 24 hours on the way. The last message gave the position as 20 miles off St. Andrews' Bay with the drag rope in the water and all supplies exhausted. At that time the wind was on shore and the balloon was slowly drifting northward.

It is on the wording of the last message that naval officials base their belief that the balloon landed somewhere on the deserted coast of the outer island. The balloon apparently had almost sufficient buoyancy to remain in the air and thus it is certain that when the basket touched the water the descent would stop. It is believed by balloon experts here that the craft would keep the men above water for several days if the weather remained calm.
