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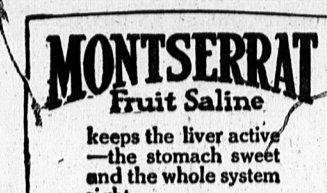
From the number of inquiries regarding the amendments passed during the last session of the Legislature, the Department of Agriculture considers it advisable to give an explanation of them as follows: 1st. The amendments relating to veterinary practice does not become operative before August 1st, and therefore does not interfere with those who are practicing until that date. When the Council is nominated, the examiners under the Act appointed and the registration fee decided upon, which will not exceed \$10.00, all those who have been practicing veterinary surgery for a living for a period of five years may register by applying at any time up to the first of August. 2nd. The amendment to the Act for the encouragement of Agriculture provides for an additional annual grant to be paid Farmers' Institutes from \$15 to \$20, for membership not exceeding thirty and for every fifteen additional members an addition of \$5, shall be paid or a proportionate it is now possible to receive a grant of \$45, which is an addition of \$30, should that previously possible. This should serve as an encouragement for greater membership. For the encouragement of using pure bred stock a special grant of \$50 can be drawn by any Institute, provided always that an equal sum is previously subscribed by the members of the Institute in addition to their ordinary membership fees. In all cases the animals must be of advanced registry breeding, or proven sires, or of superior individual merit passed and recommended by an official of the Department of Agriculture. 3rd. At the request of the various Live Stock Associations a large number of Farmers' Institutes and many prominent stock breeders the Domestic Animals Act was amended to better control the running at large of male animals and to endeavor to correct the scrub bull nuisance. The amendment reads as follows: 1. Section ten of the Act 3 Edward VII Chapter two is hereby amended by adding after the word "thereof" in the seventh line of the said section the following words, "And it shall be the duty of the owners to use the proper means for the control of such animals within the domain of their premises or enclosures." 2. Section thirty of the Act 51 Vic. Cap. 14 is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof: The owner of any animal so taken up shall be entitled to have the same returned to him if claimed before the same be sold, on tendering to the person having the custody thereof the respective penalties following, namely: For every stallion and bull twenty-five dollars; for every ram, ten dollars; for every boar pig, ten dollars; (unless a fine amount have been regularly kept in control by tying or conbroken at large) such penalty being in addition to the charges for keep and all other expenses incurred up to the time of such tender. It is now the duty of every owner who owns a sire to keep the same under control or within bounds. DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE.
