### The Latest News From Prince County.

WHAT'S the matter with putting a ferry on the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route?

REVS. J. C. McLean, Summerside and J. J. McDonald, Kinkora, have gone on a trip to Montreal.

THE all important question now is navigation between Summerside and Cape Tormentine.—Do you see the point?

THE funeral of the late Mr. Thomas Burrows will take place to-morrow afternoon to the North Bedeque Cemetery.

EVERYTHING appears to be tending toward the opening of the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route. It looms up brighter and brighter every day.

MONDAY'S Examiner says: Signs of summer.—The first straw hats appeared on our streets to-day. There is a man in this vicinity of Summerside who wears a straw hat all winter, yet we have late springs and short summers.

THE death of Mr. Thomas Burrows occurred yesterday morning at the age of 60 years. He came to P. E. Island with his parents in the year 1837 and settled at Long River. Mr. Burrows afterwards moved to New Annan where he lived and owned a valuable farm until he retired about one year ago and moved to Summerside where he has since resided. Mr. W. T. Burrows, of this town and Miss Catherine Burrows are the surviving family.

SUMMERSIDE harbor has now been navigable for any kind of craft for ten days past and yet there has not been a trip made to Point du Chêne. The Northumberland and has been expected daily to come from Charlottetown to Summerside but there is yet too much ice at the Point. It would be an easy matter for a steamer to be plying between this port and Cape Tormentine. And in fact it is safe to say that not one trip would have been missed and the Stanley been on this route during the winter.

AT the Town Council meeting on Monday night the following business was done after the telephone office was closed and thus too late for yesterday's issue: The police reported chimneys and stove pipes throughout the town in good condition. Albert Gaudet and Michael Mountain were ordered to be sworn in as special policemen to have power to make arrests at any time. On motion it was decided that the Mayor go to Alberton to see a cart off red there and if suitable for the town, to procure it. On motion of Councillor Morris, seconded by Councillor Morrison, Councillor Goss was appointed a committee of one to interview the truckmen of the town with a view of having them put four inch tires on their trucks. After the disposal of some minor business the Council adjourned.

OBITUARY.—As chronicled in a previous issue the death of Mrs. Archibald Ramsay of this town occurred on Wednesday April 13rd, in the 60th year of her age. The deceased was the second daughter of the late Solomon DesBrisay of Charlottetown Her husband, four sons, Theophilus D. John and William of Summerside and R. H. of Charlottetown, and three daughters Mrs. (Rev.) W. P. Archibald of Sunny Beach, N. S., Eliza of Montreal and Martha of Summerside, survive her. They were all at her bedside when the change came. For many years she had been in poor health, the greater part of the time being confined to her home. Through her trying illness she manifested great patience, courage and consideration for others. Possessed of excellent qualities of mind and disposition, taking a kindly and sympathetic interest in the welfare of others, she was held in the highest esteem by all who knew her. In the inner circle of her home her quick unassuming Christian life beautifully exemplified the virtues of the loving wife and devoted mother. Since her marriage she had been in communion with the membership of the Presbyterian Church. The funeral which took place on Friday to the People's Cemetery was largely attended. The bereaved husband and family have the sincere sympathy of their large circle of friends.

## S. SCHOOL WORKERS

### Held an Important Session in Zion

### THE OFFICERS ELECTED

#### And the Work of the Future Talked Over at Considerable Length.

A large number of the Sunday school workers of the city assembled yesterday afternoon in the schoolroom of Zion Church. The meeting opened by devotional exercises conducted by Rev. R. P. Whiston, Vice President of the Provincial Association for Queens County.

The election of officers resulted in the choice of Rev. J. W. McConnell for President, and A. W. Sterns for Vice President, Mrs. A. E. Morrison for Secretary-Treasurer.

The constitution as outlined in the Provincial Report was then adopted without much discussion.

Mr. D. Schirman and Mr. J. Harry Williams were elected to act with the above officers as members of the Executive committee.

Miss Wathen then taught a primary class, the Sunday school lesson for next Sunday, "The Walk to Emmaus." This was most interesting to all present, and showed much tact and ability to lead the little ones into a knowledge of Scripture truth. The lesson was pleasantly illustrated by the use of wall pictures and sketches upon the black board.

Rev. G. M. Young then gave an address upon the subject of "Primary Unions." He dwelt upon the great importance of the Primary department in the school, and the increasing interest now being taken in the training of young children in all churches. The Primary Union as its name indicates, is a union of the Primary and Junior teachers of the city for mutual helplessness.

There is a growing demand for teaching in our Sunday Schools and the objects of the proposed Union are to provide a weekly exposition and illustration of the lesson; to increase the efficiency of the work by instruction, by discussing topics of interest, by mutual conference and by gathering from all possible sources helpful information, to promote mutual acquaintance and fellowship among the primary and Junior teachers in our city. At the close of the address some time was spent in open conference which resulted in the passing of a resolution to proceed with the organization of a primary union. A nomination committee was appointed who chose the following officers:

### EVENING MEETING.

The newly elected president Rev. J. W. McConnell presided. The choir of the church were present in full force and greatly assisted in the pleasure and profit of the meeting by several choice selections.

The first speaker of the evening was Mr. J. D. Seaman, Provincial Superintendent of Normal Work. He stated that seven Normal classes were now at work with a total membership of about 150 scholars. He dwelt upon the object and aim of normal study which was to produce more efficient teachers.

He deplored the lack of real teaching in most of our Sunday schools and showed how the Normal classes might help to prepare teachers for better work.

The General Field Secretary briefly reviewed the history of the rise and progress of the International Sunday School Association's work.

Rev. R. F. Whiston followed and spoke eloquently on the relation of the Bible to the school. His address was freighted with interesting illustrations and was full of vigor and life.

He showed why we should be familiar with the Bible:

1. Because it is the only text book on God.
  2. Because it is the only book covering the full scope of the human race showing our origin and destiny.
  3. Because it is incomparable as a book of literature.
  4. Because it is the only book that reveals the plan of salvation to man.
- At the conclusion of his address Mr. McConnell thanked the choir for their efficient help and the trustees for the Church for the afternoon and evening session of the Association.
