IN MEMORIAM

MR. ERNEST INMAN

The death occurred on Oct 3rd at 68 Federal Ave., Quincy Mass., of Mr. Ernest Inman, a native of Canoe Cove, P. E. I. Mr. Inman was injured on Sept. 21st while working for the Public Works of the city. On that day while breaking stone a piece of steel broke off his stoma hammer and became embedded in the flesh of the right arm. He received medical attention and though nothing of the occurrence until a few days later when blood poisoning de- veloped. He was taken to the Quincey City Hospital in an effort to save his life but medical attention was unable to check the inroads of the disease.

The funeral of Ernest Inman was held at his late home, 68 Federal avenue, Sunday at 2:30. Services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. A. Sankey and Clan McGregor, No. 5. The funeral was largely at- tended, interment being in Mt. Wollaston Cemetery. The family have the sympathy of all in the loss of a young husband and fat- her.

By his genial disposition, his virtuous life and his christian character he has won for himself a lasting place in the memories of those who are left to mourn. Two brothers, Mark, of Canoe Cove and John Thomas of St. Catharines also survive.

A solemn Mass of Requiem was offered up for the repose of his soul by his beloved pastor, Rev. Father Campbell, who also conduct- ed the services at the grave, assist-

ed by the Rev. Father Gaudet of Bloomfield and there in the quiet little cemetery midst the sobs and tears of his many relatives and friends, he was tenderly laid to rest to await the sound of the trumpet that awaketh the Dead, May his soul rest in peace.
