**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

The Princess arrived last night at 9.15 and the express at 11.15.

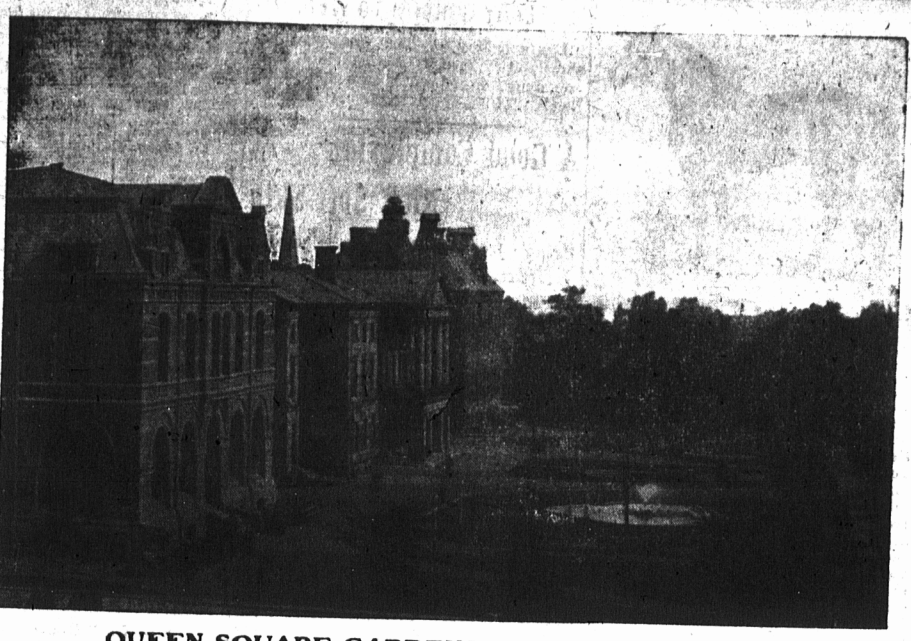

VICTORIA day was quietly observed in the city. During the day the streets were nearly all deserted the trains of the previous evening and yesterday morning, the livery stables and the Princess and ferry steamers combined to take away nearly all who could leave the city. The excursion to Pictou was one of the largest ever held on the Princess. During the afternoon the rain which fell intermittently for several hours, while aiding the fisherman, caught many at Rocky Point and other outskirts of the city unprepared. When the Princess returned from Pictou last night the wharf was crowded with spectators and the express was also filled with tired holiday pleasure seekers.

At a special meeting of the Silsby Hose Company held Monday night Frank Creehan was unanimously recommended to the City Council to take the position as captain of the company to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Capt. Ronahan, who has been appointed Chief. Mr. Creehan was a member of the winning team that carried off the honors at the Firemen's Tournament held in '92. No doubt the recommendation will meet with the hearty approval of the City Council and citizens in general.

MISS EDYTHE RACKHAM returned several ago from a very enjoyable trip to the days Southern States. Miss Rackham left Boston December 15th on a bitter cold day, the ground covered with snow. She took the boat to Norfolk, Virginia and from there crossed the ferry to Richmond then took the train to Pinehurst N. C. The further south they went the warmer it became and when she and friend arrived in Pinehurst it was like a June day in the north. The climate certainly was delightful and one could realize it being so cold at home, while there people were comfortable sitting out on the piazza with only summer clothing on. Miss Rackham arrived in the South just in time to see the Coons picking peanuts and cotton. The peanuts grow on vines something like our beans and peas. They pull them up and hang them on stakes to dry. The natives, that is the poor colored people, are very poor, one reason probably being because they are so lazy. They work as good for a dollar a week as they would for one dollar a day for if they only get one dollar a week they do not expect to work hard. They live in log cabins with only two rooms and perhaps thirty in one cabin, children and all. They seem to be very happy and do not want anything better. Miss Rackham says she always thought the pictures in Puck imaginary until she went South but thinks Puck never printed anything half so funny as some of the sights in the Southern States when the old and young go so ragged you can see their bare knees and elbows. The men would have a mullet with an apology for a wagon, perhaps four wheels and a board across. Before she left Pinehurst in April the peach orchard was out in bloom. It is one of the prettiest sight to be seen with acres of land that look like one big pink blossom. The leaves do not come on the trees till after the blossoms die off. Miss Rackham has a large number of curios which she gathered while on her trip and they form a most interesting souvenir of an enjoyable winter.
