A Fine Convention

The closing session of the Teachers' Federation convention takes place today, and it may be predicted that the meetings will be productive of much good, both for the delegates and the public in general.

"Democracy is the most difficult of all political systems. In a democracy every citizen has vital decisions to make which affect him both at home and abroad, in peace and war; the individual has a voice in choosing those who govern, and in the final analysis in deciding Government policies."

"Never have the problems affecting those associated with teaching presented a greater challenge or imposed heavier responsibilities. Children must be taught how to face a world worn by war, and meet new conditions of life that are certain to arise after the enemy is defeated."

It is the aim of the Teachers' Federation to promote this objective. They deserve every co-operation and support in this connection. It is a matter of gratification that this week's convention has seen such a large and representative attendance, and such evident interest, not only in improving the status of the profession, but in furthering the interests of everything pertaining to education in the Province.

World Economics
One of the most significant contributions made to the study of post-war problems and their solution is a book just published by the International Labour Office, with the title, Constitutional Provisions Concerning Social and Economic Policy, containing 450 constitutional texts taken from the fundamental laws of six many countries and governmental units.

Maintenance or expansion of Canada's National Income on steady and secure lines depends upon several factors: peace, national integration, international co-operation, encouragement of inventiveness and initiative, and the investment of savings in productive enterprises.

Social Credit in Quebec
In the Province of Quebec Social Credit is relatively strong. Its forces being nevertheless very scattered, the party finds itself quite unable on material ground to have its representatives elected.

A weather story out of Moscow, commenting on the uncommonly mild Russian winter this year, carried a footnote to the effect that, with the usual long, hard freeze in the middle of the winter, the Russians can travel like this in the road, we'd like to see them on a fast track—Galgary, Alberta.

Canadians are justly proud of their educational institutions. In few countries is as high a proportion of the population able to read and write. But a recent investigation raises the question whether Canadian school children are reading as much as they might be expected to do.

Saskatchewan information is that the chance of a C.C.F. Provincial Government is not very good. The heavy C.C.F. vote in the province in recent years has largely from opponents of the Liberal Government, who have had little hope of the Conservatives amounting to anything.

Hon. W. D. Euler, speaking on the Bay of Fundy power project, in the Senate, argued mildly that this was asking Ontario and Quebec to contribute to providing power for the Maritimes.

Coupon rationing of liquor in New Brunswick has brought about a radical change in methods of purchasing. Prior to April customers could buy at one time only one commodity—beer, wine or spirits.

SPRING CLEANING and fresh air go together. One sure way to keep the rooms fresh and airy is to take special care not to let strong cooking odors develop.

SARDINE SALAD BOWL: Warm spring days are just the time to include more salads in the menu.

2-2 cups cooked green beans; 2-2 cups cooked shredded carrot; 2 cups cubed cooked potato; 1 cup dried celery; 2 cups shredded romaine or lettuce; 1/2 pound can sardines of 1 cup cooked cubed fish; 1 cup French dressing.

Drain beans and carrots, reserve liquor for use in soup, sauce, etc. Combine with potatoes, celery and romaine. Drain sardines and chop. Reserve four to garlic oil. Combine beans, carrot, potato, celery, romaine with dressing. Garnish. Toss and chop sardines. Serve, eight, remaining sardines.

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
