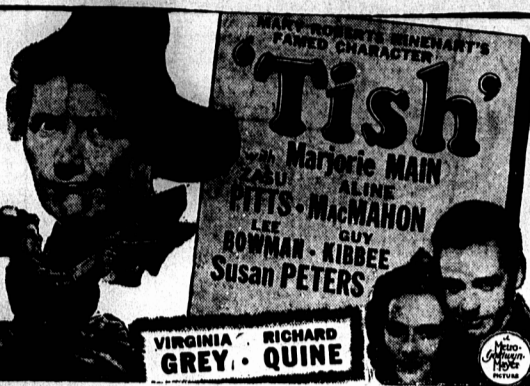

RATION BOARD MEETS - Disclosing a very unsatisfactory response to the call for voluntary workers to handle the distribution of Ration Book No. 3 in Charlottetown, the report of Miss Gertrude Starnes at the regular meeting of the Local Ration Board yesterday afternoon showed that only 30 persons had offered their services so far. Roy Holman said that Mrs. E. M. Baginall of the Red Cross Corps had notified him that they could also supply a number of workers but this total was still far below that required to hand out the number of books expected to be issued during the three-day period which commences tomorrow. The Mayor has issued an urgent appeal to school teachers, clerks, office girls and others to assist in the regular rationing. In the last campaign a total of more than 21,000 books were handed out in the city alone. Citizens will call at Queen Square entrance, for their No. 3 books. This centre is open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., each day. Final arrangements were completed for the distribution at yesterday's meeting. It was announced that Mr. J. A. MacIsaac would be distributing chief and Lt.-Col. C. C. Thompson chief inspector. The meeting was in attendance at the meeting.

N.B. Contribution To Chinese Fund

SAINT JOHN N.B., Aug. 20 - (CP) - In the third week of a campaign in New Brunswick, citizens of the Province have contributed \$1,382.21 to the Chinese war relief fund, it was announced today by George W. The fund is appealing for \$10,000 from Canada as a whole for food and medical supplies, clothing and shelter for refugees, and other relief work, to bring some alleviation of China's immense need.
