ing the past few years. Sydney's population figure had remained practically stationary and the tonnage produced was about the same as it was 30 years ago.

J. A. Walker of Halifax and R. K. Smith, M. P. of Amherst, both reiterated that the Maritimes were not envious of concessions to the western provinces, but sought just protection for their own interests in these lands.

On the question of the proposed conference of Maritime Senators and business men at Charlottetown, Senator Hanté J. Logan of Amherst precipitated a debate when he declared he did not believe the Senators would favor going to Charlottetown and should meet at Ottawa.

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ARCHBISHOP CELEBRATES HIS 25th ANNIVERSARY

Twenty five years ago today (St. Luke's Day) Archbishop Clarendon Lamb Worrell was consecrated Bishop in the Church of God by the late Most Reverend Archbishop Bond of Montreal, assisted by nine other Bishops, as the sixth Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

In 1915 Bishop Worrell was elected by the House of Bishops as Metropolitan of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada and Archbishop of Nova Scotia.

So for twenty five years His Grace has been a wise and loving Father in God to his flock. His Episcopate has been a noted one in many respects.

In 1905 St. Luke's Pro-Cathedral was destroyed by fire and there arose under the Bishops guiding hand the Cathedral Church of All Saint, Halifax.

Again twenty five years ago the Diocesan College, Kings University, was at a low ebb, but the good Bishop never lost heart and step by step through many difficulties he again led his flock until he saw a new Kings arise in Halifax, equipped with some of the best educational buildings in the Maritimes and with large endowments, and so in a better position than ever before to carry on her splendid work of one hundred and forty years.

In 1904 \$68,664.00 was paid in stipends to the clergy while today the sum of \$143,346 has been paid for this purpose.

In 1904 \$13,101.00 was paid in for Synod purposes and Diocesan, Canadian and Foreign Missions, while today the sum is increased to over \$40,000.00.

The Capital Funds of the Diocese in 1904 were \$307,507, while today they exceed \$624,000.

The church population has increased from 52,000 in 1904 to over 63,000 in 1929.

Throughout this long and successful Episcopate His Grace has been sagacious, unwarred, patient and has given persistent leadership to his followers until today the Diocese stands a united factor in the carrying on of the work of the Church of God.

Members of the Church of England and of all denominations will unite in wishing His Grace still many years of usefulness and leadership in not only the work of the church, but in all that tends to build up a better citizenship.

adian National police, several of whom accompanied the train to Ottawa. No large crowd was present. A few aware that the Prime Minister of Great Britain would go through the station, gathered for a sight of him. U. E. Gillen, manager of Toronto terminals, was in the station during the evening. Dennis O'Leary, station master, supervised the placing of the train, and saw it pass out into the night.

Mr. MacDonald reached the train a few minutes before eleven o'clock and went at once to his car. Col. Alex. Fraser, A. D. C., to the Lieutenant Governor, saw the British Prime Minister safely away. Again, Government House was carefully patrolled by police officers and the formalities observed were almost more rigid than those followed on the occasion of the last visit of the Prince of Wales.

Mr. MacDonald did not remain until six o'clock for the reception given by the Ontario Government at the Royal York Hotel. About ten minutes to five o'clock he withdrew from the throng that swarmed through the Banquet Hall, eager to catch a glimpse of him, even if they were unable to get into the receiving line. Dinner at Government House commenced shortly after seven o'clock. Invitations were restricted to men only. On Tuesday night ladies were included as guests of His Honor and Mrs. Ross. Fatigued by an arduous day, last night's dinner was made more or less informal to suit the convenience of Mr. MacDonald, and the fact that he left early for his private car indicated the effect of the strain he has been under.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 17.—In the stately reading room of the Parliament Buildings, the Government of Canada tonight was host at dinner to the Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, his daughter, Miss Isabel MacDonald and a distinguished company, including the Foreign Ministers resident in Ottawa and their wives, and members of the Canadian Privy Council, with their wives. There were 132 persons present.

According to custom, when the Government gives a dinner, the Governor-General, who as representative of the King would outrank all others present, and Her Excellency do not attend. At the conclusion of the dinner, in welcoming Mr. MacDonald, on this his fourth visit to Canada, Premier King pointed out it was the second occasion "on which our country has been honored by the presence, while in office, of a British Prime Minister. "In order to emphasize the unanimity of the welcome being accorded the Prime Minister of Great Britain on the occasion of his visit to our country, I have asked the Honorable Mr. Bennett, leader of His Majesty's loyal opposition in the House of Commons, to join with me in proposing the health of our guest, and this Mr. Bennett has kindly consented to do at the close of my remarks.

"There is not a part of Canada, nor is there a Government that has been in office during the past thirty years, which is not represented by some of its members here tonight," said Mr. King in explaining that Privy Counsellors had come from all parts of the Dominion to do honor to Mr. MacDonald. He added that he had recommended to the Governor-General that Mr. MacDonald be made a member of the King's Privy Council of Canada.
