### THE CASE OF IRELAND.

The visit of Hon. Edward Blake to Canada and his recent speeches in Toronto and Ottawa on the Irish question have once more brought the case of Ireland prominently before the Canadian people. The demand of the Irish people for self government was the burden of Mr. Blake's story. In North America home rule is the priceless boon of every state and province from the Gulf of Mexico to the Arctic Ocean. Three times the Canadian Parliament with overwhelming majorities drawn from both political parties, voted in favor of granting home rule to Ireland. Other self-governing colonies have given a similar voice, believing that self-government would consolidate the discontent of the Irish people. But British prejudices are strong and the principle of legislative union has been firmly adhered to, notwithstanding the well-known desire of four-fifths of the Irish people backed by the sympathetic support of the colonies. The result is that Ireland, with a population reduced from 8,295,061 in 1845 to 4,704,790, exists in a state of chronic discontent and only partially repressed revolt against the existing order of things.

Of her 103 members in the Commons—more than her present depleted population can entitle her to retain—four out of five are out of accord with any government that can be in power, and with any policy internal or foreign which the council of the Empire may adopt. The Irish Nationalist party are perpetually protesting against the existing order of things, frequently pushing their protest to the point of obstructing the work of Parliament, and many of them in time of war more or less openly expressing their sympathies for the enemy with whom the nation is at war. Within the Kingdom of Ireland a large armed force is maintained as in a conquered country and in addition a police force of 16,000 men, out of all proportion to what is maintained among any similar population in any civilized land. This is alleged to be necessary—this as well as special crimes acts and coercion acts, together with the suspension of the safeguards of individual liberties such as obtain in England and Canada—because the people are turbulent and riotous. And yet among the Irish people abroad, twice as numerous as these at home, there is no necessity for these harsh repressive measures. Irishmen in America have shown that they can well be trusted with all the rights and privileges which are enjoyed by all in this land of liberty. And why not at home?

There seems to be no good reason why the federal system which now prevails among ninety millions of English-speaking peoples beyond the seas, in the United States, Canada and Australia, should not be applied to the Three Kingdoms of England, Ireland and Scotland, with results as happy as have been obtained wherever that system has been tried. In Canada we give to Quebec her own Legislature, although three-fourths of her people are of a race, language and religion different from that of the great majority of the people of the Dominion. And Quebec is loyal and content. It has been said by one of her leading sons that if British rule in Canada were to be assailed by a foreign foe the last shot in its defence would be fired by a French Canadian. We believe that it is possible, by trusting the people of Ireland and giving them full control of their own local affairs to make of that country a Kingdom as loyal and content as Quebec is today. Coercion has been tried and it has failed. It has made of Ireland a thorn in the side of England and oftentimes a weakness instead of a strength to the Empire. Separation cannot be permitted, but legislative independence such as is enjoyed by each of the Provinces of Canada is another and a different thing. It has proved the strength of the union in Canada and might have an equally beneficial effect if applied to Ireland.

Our civic authorities should read over the snow by law and then enforce it. Last winter the Council did will and gave us more passable sidewalks than we had for years before. This year the onset of the winter has been early and severe, and many of the walks after being in a frightful condition for days past are still choked with snow. It is better to begin right with the first snow and then it will be easier to keep clean walks through the winter. A word to the wise is sufficient.

One pound Apothecary or Troy consists of 480 grains. One pound Avoirdupois consists of 7,000 grains. The Apothecary ounce is the heavier, but the Avoirdupois pound is the heavier by 500 grains, because it contains sixteen Avoirdupois ounces. You get a 7,000 grain pound here and the finest quality of drugs that money can buy.
