RECENT NAVAL BATTLES.

In the recent naval battles between the Japanese and Russians more large ships were engaged than in any sea fight since the days of steel armor. In the sortie from Port Arthur on the 10th August the following strength was engaged:

Battleships	Cruisers	Torpedo boats.
Russian 6	4	8
Japanese 6	11	30

In the fight in the Korean Strait on August the 14th between the Japanese and the Vladivostok squadron the Russian force was three cruisers and the Japanese five smaller cruisers. Taking the engagements together the Russians had 6 battleships, 7 cruisers and 8 torpedo destroyers and toas, pitted against a Japanese force of 6 battleships, 16 cruisers, and 30 or more torpedo craft.

The battle of the Ya'u between China and Japan was fought on September 14, 1894 between 24 battleships and cruisers—12 on each side. The Chinese had the heavier ships and the Japanese the swifter cruisers. The Japanese admiral, not expecting to meet the enemy had no torpedo craft with him at the time. The net result was that five of the Chinese ships were sunk and seven escaped in a more or less crippled condition. The Chinese loss in men was 620 and the Japanese 294. The Japanese did not lose a single ship although three of their 12 ironclads were disabled. With a more equal division of strength between the combatants, and with a smaller total of ships engaged, the battle of the Yalu

was more decisive than the recent Russo-Japanese naval fight.

In the very unequal fight between American and Spanish ships at Manila, May 1, 1898, Dewey had nine ships, four of which were protected cruisers. The opposing Spanish fleet consisted in all of eleven vessels, only two of which were steel cruisers, the remainder being small cruisers and gunboats. The Spanish ships were quickly knocked to pieces, sunk or captured. Not a man was lost on an American ship.

At Santiago on 4th July of the same year the Spanish squadron of four fine cruisers and two destroyers was destroyed in a running fight on attempting to escape from port. The actual fighting on the American side was done by the three battleships Iowa, Texas and Oregon and the armored cruiser Br olyn. The Spanish loss was their entire fleet of six vessels, 600 men killed and wounded and 1200 prisoners. This was a very real battle compared with that of Manila, but both are remarkable for the utter destruction of the ships of one belligerent. The engagement of a few days ago was much less decisive than those of Yalu, Manila and Santiago, but with a larger force of heavy fighting ships engaged.

THE STATION SITE.

The situation in regard to the railway station site appears to be this: The minority which favors an eastern location are persistent. They have the ear of the railway authorities and the Government. A persistent effort is being made to squeeze and coerce the majority to consent to place the station at Hilsborough street. We are told to choose between no new station and one at that location. This is most unfair, but this policy will prevail, if the majority are weak enough to yield.

If on the other hand the citizens, the City Council and Board of Trade will stand firm we have no doubt they will ultimately get the station where they want it, say at George or Queen Street. The engineer is here and the Minister of Railways coming. The squeezing process may continue. We are expected to give up business interests, conveniences and cherished hopes, abandoning everything, (like the Russians before the victorious Japs.) Charlottetown's backbone is to be tested. The enemy are confident that it will be found to be only an India rubber affair that can be squeezed and bent to suit themselves. We shall see.

THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

The proposal to give the Anglo-American monopoly \$5,000 a year of increased subsidy in consideration for some additional hours of service and a reduction from 50 cents to 40 cents for private messages of ten words, is not an alluring one. The monopoly will remain, somewhat strengthened by the new concession. It is not proposed to reduce the rates on press messages. It is not proposed to transmit twenty words of a private message at night at the same rate as ten words by day as is done on the mainland. In other words it is not proposed to place the people of this Province on anything like equal terms with the people of other Provinces in regard to telegraph service. Failing this, the feeling grows that \$5,000 a year is too much to pay for the limited concessions offered. If such terms were now made we should have to still continue our agitation for our just rights. It would cost the Government less to appropriate the Anglo-American lines and operate them, or lease them to the Western Union or the C. P. R. than to pay the Anglo-American \$7,000 a year, which at 3 per cent is equal to a capital of \$233,333. And in that way we would get an equitable modern service such as the Anglo-American Company is not likely ever to give us.
