L-235-2-22-21 PRODUCTION UP IN 1937 LISTS TORONTO, Feb. 21—(CP)—With one exception, all primary industries in Ontario showed an increase substantially in 1937 over the previous year according to a compilation in the Business Post book issued by the Financial Post, Agricultural and Commercial sections of Saskatchewan, suffered a decline of 12.5 per cent. Forestry led the increases with a gain of 25.7 per cent, followed by the pulp and paper industry. Other increases were: Trapping 11 per cent; electric power 8.5 per cent; and fisheries 7.4 per cent. The total of primary production was \$1,875,469,500 compared with \$1,507,880,724 in 1936. Manufactures totalled \$1,598,000,000 against \$1,495,370,000 in 1936, an increase of 6.5 per cent. Estimated national income is placed at \$4,200,000,000 compared with \$4,516,000,000, showing a gain of 7.3 per cent. The year book reports 151 new industrial plants opened in Canada in 1937, with 21 in 1936. In addition, plant extensions numbered 342 against 289. Of the new plants opened in 1937, 13 were branches of U. S. industries, one a British branch, and the others of domestic origin. Preliminary estimates for 1937 show increases in outside holdings in Canada of \$11,000,000. United States investments advanced nearly \$12,000,000 to \$2,996,000,000 while British capital continued the trend of the last three years to show a small decline. Substantial increases were made during the year in foreign investments in wood and paper industries, in mining and in insurance.

Girls Causing Tribal Warfare BATHURST ISLAND, North Australia, Feb. 21—(CP)—Aberlones on this tropical island off the northern coast of Australia prepared today for a "stare-out" civil war which probably will be raging still when all is quiet on the Chinese and Spanish battlefronts. Two thousand island natives, reinforced by relatives summoned from the mainland and the nearby Melville Islands, fight with spears, but few are mortally wounded. The battle has raged intermittently for centuries, usually because of women. The time an old man's wife has been stolen and something must be done about it. The war is open a by preliminary ceremonies. After plastering their bodies with elaborate designs in red and yellow ochre, the warriors take sides, each according to the tribal group into which he was born. When they have exhausted themselves, in an interchange of insults, spears and clubs are flung to mark the real beginning of the battle. The side scoring the most hits wins, but there is always heated argument over the referee. Because of this the battle may become more spirited as the days, weeks and months go on and the wounded recover sufficiently to renew their attacks. Much of the strife is due to the queer marriage laws of the island, which condemn a man to "childhood" until his thirtieth birthday, that man and his wife must belong to different tribes. There are no single girls on the island. Many are engaged before they are 15 and their parents, which assigns each child at birth with a mother-in-law, on the understanding that all her female offspring will be his wives. Devotion to parents is another strict rule. Some of the children are so fond of their parents they bury them alive when they become old to spare them the pain of inevitable deaths. Devotion of a husband to his wife is unknown, however. The women endure hard hips which not even missionary zeal has been able to lighten. When a Roman Catholic mission found it impossible to dissuade the aboriginal men from polygamy or cruelty to their many wives, the missionaries began buying the girls from bondage at the price of a few trinkets.

Canada's Plays Moving Toward Festival Final OTTAWA, Feb. 21—(CP)—Established as an institution in Canadian cultural life, the Dominion Drama Festival will hold the finals of its sixth annual competition in Winnipeg May 10 to 21 inclusive. The Dominion's most talented amateur actors and producers chosen from theatre groups in 11 regions will compete for at least four prizes in the festival, which has become the most important event in Canada's Little Theatre movement. Highest award is the Bessborough challenge trophy, gift of Lord Bessborough, former governor-general of Canada, presented to the group obtaining the highest number of marks in a play in either French or English. There are no restrictions concerning type or authors of the plays competing for the Bessborough trophy. Last year at the finals in Ottawa, Ontario, the presentation of "The Beauty and the Beast" won the trophy. It was a comedy written by John Cutter, an Irishman living in Toronto. Other challenge trophies also will be awarded for the best presentation in English and French respectively, including the winner of the Bessborough trophy. The festival executive committee offers a prize of \$100 to the author of the best play judged as a dramatic composition written by a person living in Canada at the time of the festival. The play is judged on its composition, its story, its characters and its acting. It would not reach the Winnipeg finals at all. Varied in Length Both short and long plays may compete at Winnipeg, the former to take more than 20 minutes but not more than an hour between acts. The latter may run for more than three hours. It is planned to hold the long plays on three nights and a matinee at the finals and the short plays on the remaining three nights and matinee. Last year Lady Tweedsmuir gave memorabilia for the best individual performance of men and women in the finals and Raymond Brucger, former French minister to Canada, presented prizes for the best individual performance in the French language by men and women. She is not known yet whether these prizes will be offered again this year. Subject to recommendations of the regional adjudicators, invitation to the part in the final festival will be extended to the three groups presenting long plays in English which are reported to have been awarded the highest marks in the group presenting the long play in French receiving the highest mark, without regard to the regions in which the plays have been presented. Regional festivals have been held in the Maritimes, in one Quebec district and in Manitoba. Regional Adjudicator Malcolm Forbes will judge plays in the other western provinces, Ontario and the other Quebec district during the next two months. "TOTE" GOES HIGH WELLINGTON, N.Z. WANT MIGRATION FOR POPULATION CANBERRA, Feb. 20—Australia's population has begun to increase rapidly after a severe contraction during the depression. At Sept. 30 last the population was 6,846,398, an increase of 39,946 in the first nine months of the year. (The Dominion Bureau of Statistics' estimate of Canada's population in 1937 was 11,120,000. The census of 1937 counted 10,976,786.) If Australia's present rate of increase is maintained the population will pass the 7,000,000 mark about the middle of 1940. The government hopes, however, that a rise in birth rate recorded in the last year will be increased and that British immigration will develop raising the population to more than 7,000,000 in less than two years. Not only has the birth rate risen, but the loss of population through migration has decreased. Nevertheless, for the first nine months of last year there was a net loss of population through migration of 677 persons. For the corresponding period of 1936 the population loss through migration was 2,165 persons. Excess of births over deaths for the first three-quarters of 1937 was 40,213 persons. For the corresponding period of 1936 the natural increase was 35,191 persons. Victoria and South Australia are the only states in the Commonwealth in which women outnumber men.
