Replying to a question asked by Mr. Irving in the Legislature if a petition had been received from residents of Pownal, Lot 49, asking for the lowering of the grade on Gay's Hill and what action the Commissioner of Public Works intended to take thereon—Honorable Mr. Cumiskey replied that he fully realized the importance of the work and the reasonableness of the request. He further stated that the department had secured improved facilities for lowering grades and would give the petitioner's request prompt attention.

At a session of the local Government in St. John last week it was decided to make the usual grant of \$5,000 to the St. John exhibition association as promised by the late government. It was decided also to make a grant of \$2,500 to the Sussex-Studholm Agricultural Society for an exhibition in Sussex.

More than 200 nobles of the Arabic order of the Mystic Shrine met in conjunction in St. John on Thursday last including a number from Charlottetown. Thirty weary pilgrims walked over the hot and thirsty sands and were given the glad hand on their arrival at the tents of the high potentate. The Easter number of Collier's is very severe upon our Island Legislature for rejecting the ballot and admitting postmasters to the open vote as 'the wretched vote, the covered vote, the time-serving vote, the boughten vote, that must stay bought because the goods have to be delivered in public.' As to the other proposal—to allow postmasters to run for the Legislature Collier says: 'If the postmaster wants to become a member of the Island Legislature, let him resign his federal office and his federal salary, and be nobody's man but his own and Prince Edward Island's. He should not belong to the party in power as Ottawa for many reasons that need not be mentioned here. Membership in Parliament, whatever provincial or national, must be kept free from suspicion. If the case is otherwise, not only is the independence of Parliament undermined, but provincial rights are in danger.'

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Successing to a few weeks' illness Pope Clarke, auditor of the Victor Fuel company, died last night at his home, 1625 Clarkson street. Death was due to uremic poison. Mr. Clarke was born in Prince Edward Island, 46 years ago. He came to Denver in 1890 from Montana. He immediately entered the service of the Colorado Fuel & Iron company in a clerical capacity. He left this position to go with J. C. Osgood as auditor of the American Coal company. He became associated with the Victor Fuel company in 1902. Mr. Clarke was a man of fine attainments and his death is considered a great loss by the company he served so long. Last September Mr. Clarke was married to Mrs. Helen Shanley, who survives him. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made. (The foregoing is taken from a Denver paper of April 1st. His sound practical work and advice have added greatly to the value of his religious ministrations, and his long service to and interest in all that might promote the agricultural prosperity of this island have given him a unique position among laymen.' He is the honoured Deputy Vice-President of the Agricultural Society, and never misses a meeting. His opinion always commands respect, and his tactful chairmanship during some months of last year did much to heal differences and to restore confidence in, and strengthen the membership of, the society. He is still an excellent specimen of the muscular Christian, always ready to take his share in anything conducive to public good, and one who does not seem to have aged a day in the last twenty years.

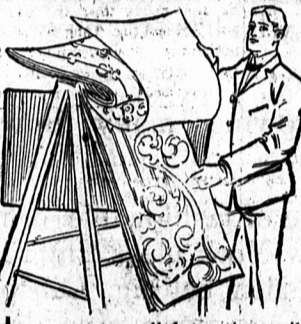
