## OYSTERS AND OYSTERS.

Long before the coming of the white man the Indian feasted on the delicious oysters found in the bays and estuaries that open to the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The redman found them a luscious and healthful food, and successive generations of white men have since found them so. In fact Prince Edward Island oysters have become famous throughout North America as among the finest in the world. The one only regrettable fact is that there are not enough of them. Their very excellence has led to their exhaustion.

But there are oysters and oysters. It is one thing to take your oyster fresh from the pure waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and quite another thing to swallow another that has been grown and fattened in the filth and pollution of New York Bay and the adjacent waters. Once you think of it very disgustful for the place in which it lived and grew should prevent the latter from being used as human food. And science has demonstrated that the New York oyster may carry death into the home as unerringly as a rifle shot.

The New York American has demonstrated the truth of this. It has secured samples of the oysters of that vicinity fresh from their native beds, samples also of the mud and water in which they grew and had them tested in the best micro-scopical and chemical laboratories with the most startling results. They are teeming with bacteria of the most deadly type. In each of 88 tests from 75,000 to 350,000 coliform bacilli were found in a quantity of mud no more than enough to fill a lady's thimble. How could it be otherwise?

In every twenty-four hours there are dumped into the harbor of New York 455,000,000 gallons of sewerage, excreta of a population of 5,000,000 people—of young and old, of many nationalities, the healthy, the sick and the dying, the latter smitten with all the diseases that flesh is heir to. Out of this mass of pollution, filth and disease come the oysters, actually grown and fattened on such material, and then eaten raw as a delicacy by an unsuspecting people. We trust that no one who reads these lines will eat oysters when hereafter they may visit New York.

Well, surely there are oysters and oysters! Up here in the cold northern waters, uncontaminated from any source we have the best oysters in the world, delicious in flavor, healthful as food, and absolutely clean. Let us count it as one among the many blessings for which we ought to be thankful. And when the big cities of the south and the inland awaken to a full realization of all the facts will there not be a new demand for pure, clean, healthful Island oysters at any price?

That day is surely coming and we should prepare for it by well-considered measures for the development and conservation of our oyster fishery as a mine of untold wealth.

## MISTAKEN CHARITY.

Our City and Province know little of real poverty, yet we have even here some who would rather beg than earn an honest livelihood. As a case in point, the other day two boys, pleading poverty and want of food, called at a house soliciting charity. The lady who met them gave them twenty-five cents. On her husband's return at night she related the incident. He feared that she had made a mistake and suggested that she make inquiry at the nearby grocery where the would-be paupers were known.

This was done with the result of

learning that the family were not in need, but were in the habit of sending out the younger members to beg. They had shared in a distribution of clothing not long before and had afterwards pawned the clothing given them. There is a lesson in this against indiscriminate giving to street beggars. Our people are charitable as any in the world, and are often deceived into giving to those who are not needy. The existing conditions suggest the necessity for an organization of associated charities such as most other cities have.

Such an organization is needed in many ways, as for instance to seek out any cases of poverty that are not known, and to see that relief when given is not duplicated from several sources while needier cases are wholly neglected. Instances have been known in this and other cities where misplaced charity has been bestowed by three or four churches to the same family, each unconscious of what the other was doing and each supposing the family dependant upon the one church or society. Also an associated charity is needed to prevent the degradation and annoyance of street begging and house to house solicitation for relief.
