also appreciate the fair manner the Attorney-General prosecuted our case.

"I wish in particular to thank our young Counsel for the splendid manner he conducted our defence and I've eloquent appeal he made to the jury on our behalf. We very gratefully appreciate it and wish him every success in his profession.

"We feel that your Lordship acted very impartially and noticed the manner you sustained the many objections made on our behalf by our Counsel.

"Although the jury found the weight of the evidence was against us we still insist that we are not guilty of the death of Peter J. Trainor."

He had been wondering since their conviction by the Jury Saturday, Mr. Justice Saunders said "if I would be able to brace myself for the awful ordeal and duty of condemning my fellow man to death."

"The retribution for your crime is settled by the laws of the realm, and on me is imposed the duty of carrying it into effect.

"The law of God, and the law of the land demand it, for the protection of society.

"May I remind you, that you will appear before another Judge, the great Judge of all the world—before you pass into His Presence, may I in all sincerity urge you to prepare for the great day. Though your natural body may die, I hope your spiritual body will continue to live. Is that future life to be for you utter misery, eternal separation from God and all goodness; or will you now not take the opportunity still left to you to receive from the hand of your loving Father forgiveness and blessing and eternal peace.
