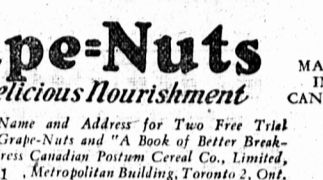

Archdeacon Is Created Bishop Of Peterborough

Rev. Claude Martin Blagden of Coventry Gets Historic See Where Expenses Are so Heavy Holder is Almost Obligated to Have Private Means; Diocese to be Divided.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—Rev. Claude Martin Blagden, archdeacon of Coventry since 1923, has been appointed Bishop of Peterborough in succession to the Rt. Rev. Cyril Bradley.

The diocese is now to be divided and a new diocese of Leicester created. Bishop Bradley was elected to become the first Bishop of Leicester.

The new bishop is 53 years of age. He was an Oxford scholar and lecturer and formerly Canon of Coventry and Archdeacon of Warwick.

It is understood that the prime minister has had some difficulty in finding a suitable appointee for Peterborough, because the expenses attached to the office are so heavy that the holder is almost obliged to be a man in possession of private means.

Nominally the official salary is £4,500, but a previous bishop, the Rt. Rev. E. Carr-Glynn, who retired in 1916 and is now 83, draws a pension of £1,500 this being provided out of the official salary.

Another £500 has now been taken off towards the provision of the stipend for the new Bishop of Leicester. When Bishop Woods, now of Winchester was at Peterborough he published a balance sheet showing that after official and travelling expenses there was left only £1,150 for household and personal expenses.

The Bishopric of Peterborough is now nearly 400 years old. It is for many reasons an arduous office, but many holders in recent years have received still higher office in the Church of England.

fore be removed from our statute book, one moment's consideration tells us that immediately some other source of revenue must be found for Governments must have revenue. It imposes upon goods of the luxury class will not provide it, then the ordinary commodities of household life must pay the price, and sugar, tea and coffee fruitly manufacture articles which we import must pay larger duties.

That means at once increased cost of living. If our industries are taxed for the purpose then our manufacturers must compete unfairly against the foreign factory which can ship its goods into our country duty free.

A source of revenue must be found. If on the other hand someone objects that it is the Prohibition Act that is wrong, let us suppose it removed and see what happens. We set up increased facilities for liquor by licensing certain establishments for the purpose but we do not reduce the price because the Custom's Act remains. In consequence we leave every inducement for the smuggler to continue his nefarious trade, and that he does so is the experience of every man who has stated there were 100 convictions under the Prohibition Act last year, each of which involved a violation of the Customs Act.

That means that there were approximately 100 people in this Province who have been willing to put their hands in the Treasury of Canada and take the money which should have been the property of the Canadian Government. They would not pick their neighbor's pockets. They would just steal from the Government. They are just common thieves.

Further the existence of these people engaged in this unlawful business indicates that there are some hundreds of others who will buy from them knowing that the goods have been stolen. Still further back there are people perhaps too cowardly to engage in the trade, who encourage this infraction of the law by their talk and protect its devotees by their silence. They are not common abettors of crime. They are people who claim to be loyal, who salute the flag and sing God Save the King, but they dishonor the King when they dishonor his laws and make themselves partners of crime.

Need I point out that this condition of affairs breaks all laws. It produces godlessness. It causes people to think lightly of the word "Thou shalt do no murder." It produces a perfect harvest of crime which is comprised in the adulteration of food, the adulteration of wine, the adulteration of milk, the adulteration of meat, the adulteration of drugs, the adulteration of cosmetics, the adulteration of clothing, the adulteration of everything that is sold.

Now I want to ask of my congregation two things, first that they shall be British and second that they shall be Christian. Honor the King—keep the law. If there is a law which is not satisfactory, then it is your duty and mine by lawful effort and through proper channels to see that it is corrected. It is neither British nor Christian to disobey the law and to flout it, and encourage others to do so because it does not suit our personal appetite. God Save the King!

MAKES PROTEST Captain Garibaldi Asserts That He Would Not Sell His Friends For Money

PARIS, Jan. 22.—Vehement protestations that he was not an Italian spy or a betrayer of his comrades, featured his first day of the Captain Ricciotti Garibaldi, grand-uncle of the Italian patriots, yesterday appeared before the Paris court of assizes, charged with the possession of firearms and complicity in a plot to free Catalonia from Spain.

In the background of this charge were others—that he had taken money from the Fascists and yet simultaneously had pretended to take part in anti-Fascist plots and that he had betrayed the Catalonians with whom he was accused of working.

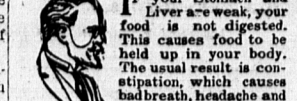
"Who one bears the name Garibaldi and when one has rendered services such as I have to France," Captain Garibaldi shouted in reply to accusations that he had betrayed the Catalonians for money, "one doesn't sell his friends for thirty pieces of silver."

SHANGHAI, Jan. 22.—Foreign volunteers were ordered to stand by for military service today, double guards were stationed in the business area for the night tour of duty and police reserves were mobilized at the three central stations where trammy strikers celebrated the company's acceptance of their demands.

acter. "If a man love Me I will manifest Myself to him." He had told the disciples many things about Himself, but He would disclose the depths of His life and personality to those who would love Him.

Dr. Massey's sermon at the evening service was founded on the words in Isaiah "Go through, go through, the gates prepare ye the way of the people."

It was a tale of two cities, Babylon where for three generations the children of Israel had been in bondage; and Jerusalem where, though its walls were in broken heaps and its temple ruined and deserted, the captive people still dreamed and hoped they would find home and hope and freedom. Go out through the gates of Babylon. Mankind has long been in bondage, but now the gates of bondage are opened and the cry goes forth to enter a new life.

Go through the gates into the Jerusalem of the new life. Too often we stop just outside the gates; we have come far but we refuse to take the one step more and go in to perfect faith.

Go through the gates out to the service of our fellow men. We are to prepare a highway for the people; we are the servants of our generation and must serve as our Master did. He took up the cross and went out through the gates to Calvary and death, and any man coming after Him must take up his cross and go through the gates to sacrifice.

In the morning the choir sang the anthem "What are these?" Taylor's magnificent anthem "God That Madest Earth and Heaven." Both these numbers were rendered with splendid effect by the large choir and well balanced choir.

Annual Report Of The Bank Of Nova Scotia

The ninety-fifth Annual Report of the Bank of Nova Scotia which appears in our issue today is an other evidence that the year just closed has been a satisfactory one for Canadian business. The profits for the year amount to \$2,242,242.99, which is an increase of \$105,322.56 over those reported in the previous year. The balance carried forward of \$450,644.39 made this Dividends amounting to \$1,600,000 were paid. Circulation Tax took \$100,000. Contribution of \$85,000 was made to the Officers' Pension Fund, \$250,000 was written Off Bank Premises Account, leaving a balance of \$658,887.38 to be carried forward to the next year.

The Statement of Assets and Liabilities shows the Bank to be in its usual strong position. Cash, consisting of current coin, Dominion notes and foreign currencies totals \$29,758,942.42, which is 13% of Liabilities. Quick Assets amount to \$136,393,828.70, or 60% of Liabilities. In keeping with the large volume of business done in the country last year, the Bank's Current Loans show an increase of slightly over \$5,000,000 and now stand at \$75,944,208.49. Current Loans Elsewhere than in Canada were practically unchanged at \$19,732,829.27. The Bank's investment account total \$54,249,368.67 showing a reduction of \$4,678,800.76 from 1925. Bank Premises Account stands at \$7,175,201.40 as compared with \$7,500,703.26.

On the Liabilities side of the Statement, Notes of the Bank in Circulation appear at \$14,981,152.95 a slight increase over the previous year. Total Deposits are \$190,832,242.08, an increase of almost \$1,000,000, most of which appears in the Savings of Interest-Bearing Deposits.

The Combined Reserve Fund and Undivided Profits total \$20,168,837.38, or more than double the Paid Up Capital of \$10,000,000.
