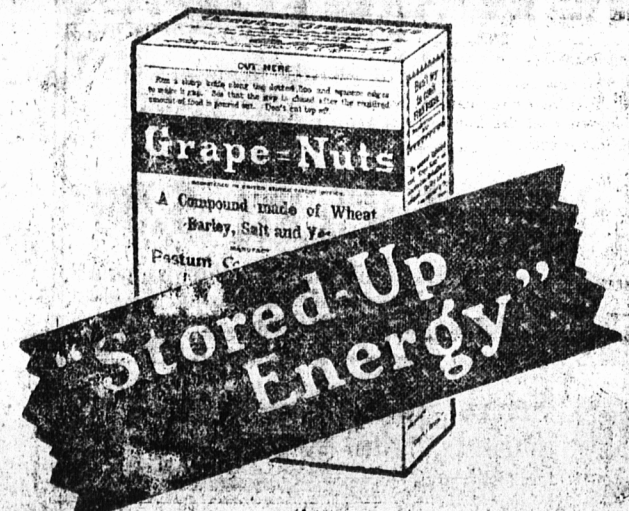

IN MEMORIAM

FRANCES SOPHIA McQUILLAN.

The death is recorded of Frances Sophia second and dearly beloved child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McQuillan, 50 Maynard street, Halifax. She was in her fourth year, and was a very promising little girl—the idol of her parents, and the sunshine of the home. Her death occurred under very sad circumstances. Accompanied by her mother and her little brother and sister, she was spending the summer of the home of her relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Edward R. Laveroy, Auburn, Prince Edward Island. Shortly after her arrival she became ill of spinal meningitis, and she passed away on the 25th inst., after two weeks' suffering, despite the best medical attendance, and the loving ministrations of gentle hands. Her grandmother, Mrs. George McGuire, and her aunt, Mrs. Mary Ann, were hastily summoned and they reached her a few days before the end—a very sad parting in life. A particularly sad feature of the passing was the fact that she was leaving the 25th Battalion during the early stages of the war. Her body was brought home on Saturday and interment made Monday afternoon in Mount Olivet cemetery.

The 120th Battalion, Windsor, N. S. The 121st Battalion, Vernon, B. C. The 126th Battalion, Camp Borden. The 128th Battalion, Winnipeg.

Ottoman Rule At End In Arabia

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Aug. 27.—The Grand Sheriff of Mecca, Chief Magistrate of the Holy City, who announced his independence of Ottoman rule in June, and supported by Arab tribes captured the Turkish garrison of Mecca and several other cities, has proclaimed the complete rupture between "orthodox" Mohammedans and those represented by the committee of union and progress, which is now in power in Turkey. In his proclamation, as reported from Cairo by Reuters' correspondent, the Grand Sheriff, Sherif Hussein Pasha, Talat Bey and Djemal Pasha, young Turk leaders, staunch supporters of Germany and among the most powerful figures in Turkey. Djemal Pasha is commander of the Turkish forces in Syria and is reported to have adopted severe measures to crush the revolution.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., August 27.—Sir George Maurice O'Rourke, speaker of the New Zealand House of Representatives is dead.

Revolving Crime In Amherst, N.S.

(Special to the Guardian.) AMHERST, Aug. 28.—Arthur L. Fitzgerald, a man aged 55, was this morning taken to Highlands View Hospital suffering from a self-inflicted gash on his throat in an attempt to end his life. His own daughter, aged 18, laid a charge before Crown Prosecutor Harvey, accusing him of incest. Officers Pickerman and Chapman went to his home to serve him with a warrant issued by C. E. Casey, J. P. He requested time to go to his room to change his clothes, followed within five minutes by the officers who found him in bed. A gash across his throat from which blood was freely oozing. He has a heart ailment and a sharp point of knife, a doctor who immediately summoned him found that an artery had been severed. He was taken to the hospital. There is a slight chance of his recovery. The accused who came from Kings Co., N. S., about three years ago is employed in the Amherst Planos. He has a wife and eleven children. The victim is sixteen years old and is a fine looking, prepossessing girl.
