After the ceremony Dr. Blanchard and his bride left by the express on a honeymoon trip to Boston and other American cities. They were accompanied by Captain Gallant, who had come to visit his son-in-law. Their host of friends extended heartiest congratulations.

STANCHEL SCHOOL—The semi-annual examination of Stanchel School was held on Wednesday afternoon, January 30th, in the school room, in the presence of a large number of parents and visitors, upwards of twenty six being present. The large number of visitors present testified as to the unity and good will which exist between teacher, parents and pupils. AT SACKVILLE—The Sackville Tribune says: "Sackville, change of Edward Island." This is what the tribune says now as trains approach Sackville. It looks as though Sackville has had restlessness thrust upon her; that incident, through no action of its own, the town had become an important junction point. The carrier steamer is working in an eminently satisfactory manner, the only trouble at present being the rail connections. The narrow gauge road on the Prince Edward Island and the poor condition of the N.B. & P.E.I. branch, necessitating the running of the trains no faster than twenty miles an hour, are difficulties in the way of having a service between Prince Edward Island and the mainland far superior to anything in the past. During the coming summer there should be much activity at Sackville, at points along the line of the N.B. & P.E.I. railway and on Prince Edward Island. There should be a new station built at Middle Sackville, with an agent in charge all the time. There should be a big round house built on the outskirts of Sackville, and sidings without number built at Sackville. These needs are urgent and we presume have been carefully considered by the C.G.R. officials. To make sure that Sackville gets all to which she is justly entitled, and to see that a big round house is not built right in the centre of the town, it would be a good idea for Sackville's Board of Trade to hold a meeting and discuss thoroughly the whole situation. If our Board of Trade is at present dead, we might have a resurrection. If it is merely sleeping then we could have an awakening that would undoubtedly do good. The Tribune is not "after" anyone; we are merely speaking in the interests of the town and its people.

SAFETY FIRST HINTS

Some safety hints for the winter, which are intended to guard against serious accidents and a possible loss of life, are being sent out broadcast by the electric light companies. From them may be selected the following:

Do not cover an electric globe with paper or cloth. It may start a fire. Do not hang an ordinary lamp cord over a nail or metal work. Do not give a cord connected when you are through with it. Do not touch any wire that is down on the ground, whether it is an electric telephone or otherwise. In an emergency, remove a wire with an instrument equipped with a wooden handle, keeping the full length of the handle between you and the wire.—Popular Science Monthly.
