as an indication. Stress is again laid upon the "big audiences" turning out to hear MacKenzie King. Of course they do. Curiosity is universal. Conservatives in abundance will be there, but it will be no indication that they are turning Liberal. The people would turn out in just as heavy numbers to see a bull fight, but it does not follow that they WOULD EMBRACE THE BULL.

But their prophetic machine has recently made a slight change of tactics. About a fortnight ago they were going to sweep everything, and in figures of results they were so prolific that it was an open question as to whether there were not going to be more Liberals returned than there were seats to be filled. But now they are becoming slightly more modest, and it really looks as if they will allow the Conservatives and Farmers a seat or two. Their generosity is boundless in this respect, but after all there is method in their madness. In instance, they based their last estimate on a clean sweep in Prince Edward Island and in Quebec. Now this was splendid chaff for thrashing in the outside provinces, but in both these provinces it didn't work at home. In east iron fact the people of these places know better. And now they modify it by admitting two seats for the Government in P. E. I. and claiming a clean sweep in Quebec, when talking to electors in this province, and then reversing the process in Quebec, by admitting a foothold for the Government there, and claiming a clean sweep in P. But the Globe should make allowance for the fact that in the absence of anything in the shape of a definite public policy to advocate or of some kind of campaign material to use in the contest, the Liberal newspapers are in a most unhappy plight for "find in" matter and that falacious prediction, and race and creed prejudices are the only campaign materials they now have to fall back upon; in any case the Liberal counting of unhatched chickens out of candled eggs is the more ridiculous in the face of the practical defeat of the Foster Government of N. B. and the actual wiping out of the Stewart Government of Alberta, both Liberal, and a like defeat of their Norris Government of Manitoba, which is now stumbling to country on behalf of the Farmers, as the consideration upon which they are permitted to hold office.

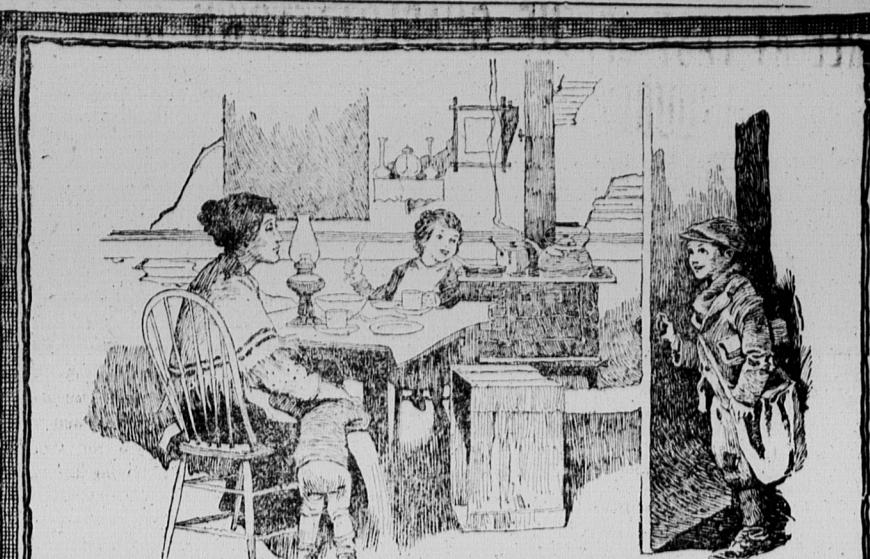
LETTER OF CONDOLENCE

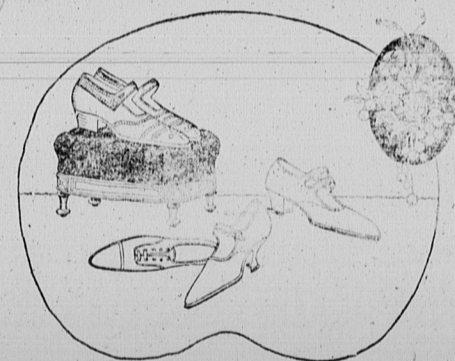
## SPANISH PARLIAMENT CALLED
