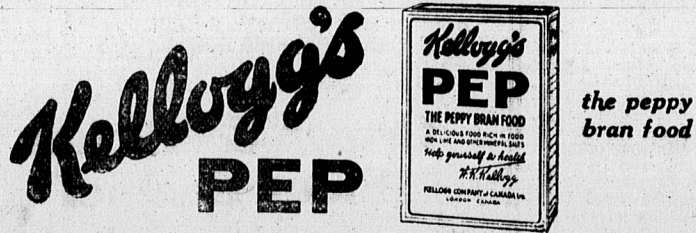

doing and accomplishing is not taken advantage of. Your Trustees as consequence are not down hearted and take your lack of attending these meetings as a vote of confidence and a tacit acknowledgement that you are satisfied with the manner in which the work has been carried on. There are two things that will generally induce large attendance at an annual meeting. One is the possibility of a dividend being paid and the other the probability of a row. We do not declare dividends and I hope we will develop no rows. The dividends we pay are not the kind you are accustomed to receive, they are however of a far greater value and are paid to those who need them most. Our dividends are paid in service, curing the sick, alleviating pain, allaying the fears and worries of our patients, bringing health and peace where there was naught but sorrow and care. These dividends are not paid once a year but every day and every hour and the fund from which they come is always ready for any emergency and any call. Our records of dividends paid is one which we are exceedingly proud of, it is a record of service, faithfully and conscientiously performed. We do not fear the probability of a row for all are united in their efforts to make the Hospital an outstanding success. This fact precludes the possibility of any misunderstanding and creates a happy harmony and co-operation among all the branches of the management that makes this success assured.

As so few of you take advantage of the opportunity of attending these annual meetings I am going to trespass upon your indulgence and tell you something of the success that has been attained through these united efforts. For successful we have been to such a degree that we are recognized in the Hospital World as an Institution that is operated in a most efficient manner. In this day of deficits and intense campaigns for raising funds it is rare to have a Hospital make ends meet. We have done more than this and have added year by year to our Endowment Fund material amounts earned through our regular channels.

It may be interesting to you to know the amount of our Revenue and where it comes from, also our expenses and what it goes for. Last year we received:

We have kept within our means and have accumulated a balance of \$1670.61 accounted for in a great measure out of the actual earnings of the Hospital itself, although we must not overlook the material assistance rendered by the contributions of vegetables, linen, etc. from the Ladies Aids and the people direct.

It is a pleasure to be able to make such a satisfactory financial showing but it is a far greater pleasure and far more satisfactory to be able to tell you of the work we have accomplished in the Hospital itself. We have had during the year that is passed 646 patients, the largest number we have ever had. There were 278 males, 368 females, 389 surgical cases, 154 medical cases, 56 obstetrical and 47 infants. 525 were pay patients, 20 were free and 101 or 15 per cent free. 197 were from the town, 442 from the country and 7 from outside the province. There were 45 different kinds of medical cases, 73 surgical and 121 cases still the most popular. For this present year which will be ending very soon, we have done even better for we served 750 patients, 388 being surgical and 163 medical. 126 appendicitis cases and 105 Adenoids, and 42 infants were born unto us which includes two sets of twins.

Tonight we have gathered together to do honor to our graduating nurses and to impress upon them, if need be, the importance of the vocation they have chosen.

Nursing calls for some of the finest attributes that humanity is endowed with. Self sacrifice and unselfishness is the foundation upon which it is built and the structure is sympathy and understanding. The rewards to be gained by the nurse are many. The love and the esteem earned through their conscientious labors are the greatest of them. The feeling of comfort and confidence created throughout the whole household upon the arrival of the capable nurse is only another indication of the exceedingly high re-
