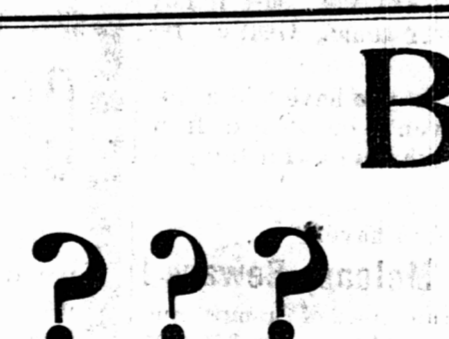
FAREWELL TO REV. J. K. FRASER.—A very large meeting of the people of Alberton, representing all denominations, was held in the Presbyterian church on Wednesday evening, 21st inst., to say farewell to Rev. J. K. Fraser, the pastor, who has resigned and is leaving the charge after a successful pastorate of seven years. After the opening exercises, consisting of singing, reading and prayer, an address to the pastor was read by the chairman, Rev. A. D. McDonald, on behalf of the officers and members of the congregation, and a substantial purse presented as a further token of the respect and esteem in which Mr. Fraser is held by his people. These were suitably acknowledged by the recipient in a brief but felicitous address, in which he recounted the circumstances under which he was led to accept the congregation's call; referred to the success attending his labors and the kindly relations which had existed from the first between his people and himself. After addresses by Rev. Mr. Forbes, the Episcopal minister, Rev. Mr. Goldsmith, Methodist; Rev. Mr. Gunn, of Bordenfield, and the chairman, and a number of selections by the choir, including a solo by Miss Clay, the benediction was pronounced and then an opportunity was given to all present, and heartily taken advantage of, to say good bye to the minister. Rev. Mr. Fraser left on Thursday for New York, where he will spend the winter taking a post graduate course in theology in Union Seminary.

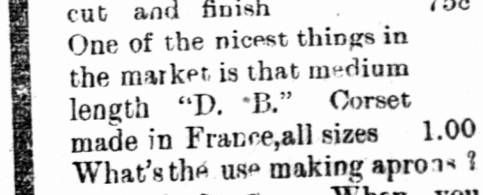
