## Holman's Gained Big Lead In Opening Game Of City League Finals

Holman Victors took a stranglehold on the City Hockey League title at the Arena last night when they garnered a four-goal lead in the first game of the two game total goal series with L. P. Unions. The score was 4-1.

Striking with lightning-like rapidity half way through the first period after having a distinct edge on the play, Holman's rapped in three counters in five minutes, the first coming with the Unions a man short. For the balance of the period the winners carried the play to their opponents but the losers held on until the rest bell.

Breaking away from a Union gang play, Bob Holman gave his team a four goal lead again, skating in on Lawlor unmolested to give the L. P. U. janitor no chance.

Cox, Lawlor and McInnis were the shining lights on the Victors attacking division, while Ferguson and Baker behind the line turned in smart performances.

Bill Ryan on the losers lineup turned in another cage game and his plays several times could easily have borne fruit. D. Gillis and Lund also playing hard hockey throughout.

### Leading Scorer In U.S. Section In Running For The Lady Byng Trophy.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—A blot on Frank Boucher's clean playing record was removed here tonight with announcement by President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League that the clever centre of New York Rangers has not served any penalty this year.

In the lists of the past week or two Boucher was credited with two minutes in the penalty box in 37 games but Calder stated it was a scorers' error and the leading assist maker in the League and perennial winner of the Lady Byng Trophy again has a clean slate.

The teams which head the respective sections also lead in individual scoring, the weekly statistics showed. Charlie Conacher of the Toronto Maple Leafs, International Section leaders, still tops the league with 23 goals, 19 assists, 42 points. Boucher at the top of the United States Section has 10 goals, 26 assists for 36 points.

Jacob Ruppert, Yankee owner, and Lou Gehrig, his hard hitting but rebellious first sacker, each with an olive branch pinned to his coat lapel, will go into a salary huddle tomorrow and the betting is that Gehrig will be aboard the Yankee handwagon by sundown.

Baseball circles believed the two will reach a speedy compromise; that Gehrig will sign for a flat good work and did some very good work and played a clean game. From the face off Ken Beer made an exceptionally fine play for the Primroses when he cleverly worked his way through the enemy's front and support lines to make number one count just 24 1-4 seconds after the face off.
