NOTWITHSTANDING the inclemency of the weather and the general poor state of traveling, on Friday last Jan. 15th, a large number of residents and other visitors assembled at the weekly meeting of the Alberry Plains Literary and Debating Society. Among those present was counted a goodly percentage of the young ladies of Alberry Plains and vicinity, who had come thither in the expectation of enjoying a rare intellectual treat, with the possible epilogue of enslaving some of the bashful swains. Their expectations were fully realized, for, when some preliminary business had been disposed of, the debate on "Which is the better for a young man starting out in life, Wealth or Education" was opened on the side of education by Chas. McMillan, with an address, which from start to finish, commanded the closest attention of his audience. His arguments were ably answered by A. Lannan, the respondent, who showed that education alone without any material wealth to back it, generally makes clever manufactures. The other members of the association then spoke, and the debate waxed warm and interesting till the hour of adjournment drew nigh, when a division was called, the vote resulting in a slight majority in favor of education. Before departing the audience were treated to a comic reading by A. Lannan and a recitation by Miss Mary Jenkins, who although it was her first appearance as an elocutionist acquitted herself in a manner that drew many favorable comments from the delighted audience.

THE annual meeting of the congregation of St. Andrew's church, Montague was held on the 13th inst. The reports showed that gratifying progress had been made in almost all departments of church work during the past year. The session reported seven additions by profession of faith to the membership of the church, five prayer meetings, four of which are in operation during the summer months. The Woman's Missionary Society reported 40 members, amount contributed for missions \$27.00. The Ladies' Aid Society reported having raised during the year by fees, lecture and bazaar \$246.00. The Sabbath school under the energetic Superintendent, Wallace Campbell and a band of faithful teachers has done good work. Money raised during the year \$105.00, expended on Library, Sabbath School supplies and missions \$94.67. The Trustees reported having acquired more land and erected horse-sheds sufficient to accommodate 35 teams at a cost of \$332.00. To meet this outlay \$175.00 had been received in subscriptions and \$81 from the Ladies' Aid Society, leaving still due \$279, which is partly covered by subscriptions not yet due. The Church Treasurer, James Aitken, reported that the finances of the congregation had been carried on during the first quarter of the year by the old subscription lists. During that quarter there was collected \$237. Since April contributions were received by envelope on the Sabbath, covering stipend, current expense and missions. These amounted to \$1001 with \$50 still to be received. Besides the above \$15 for missions had been received from Lower Montague. Total receipts \$1,804. It was found that after defraying all congregational expenses and making a generous contribution to the schemes of the Church that the pastor's stipend could be increased \$50 for the past year which amount was unanimously voted.
