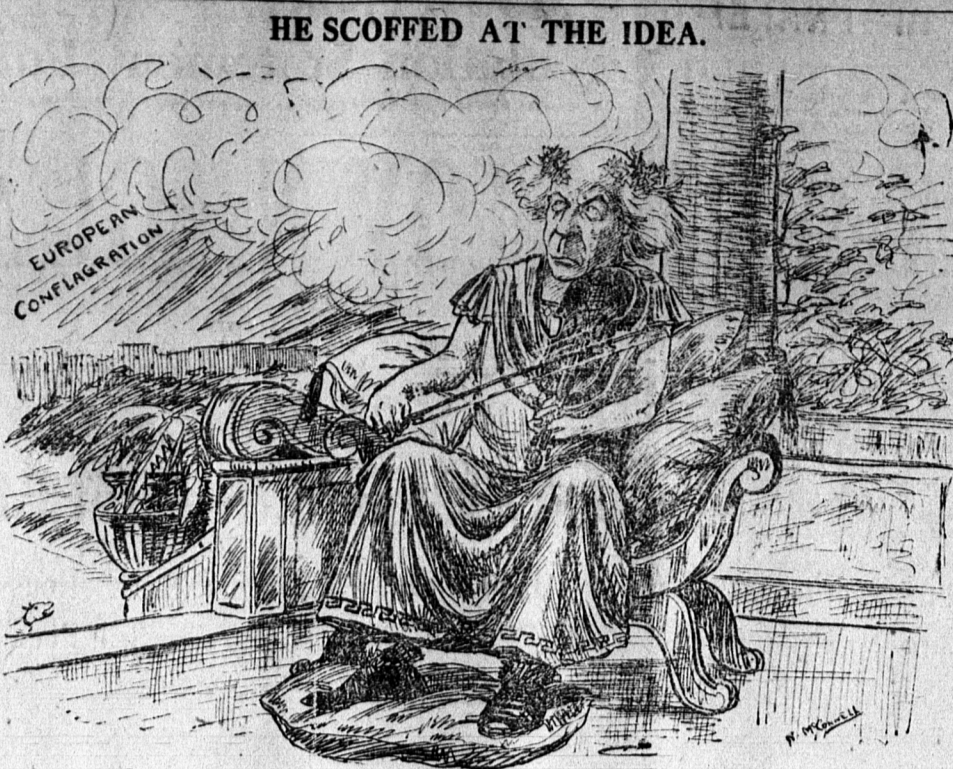

EVERYONE HELPS TO COMBAT GASES

LONDON, April 28.—The War Office has issued an invitation to the heads of British households to make supplies of the simple respirators which are required by the troops at the front as a protection against asphyxiating gases. The respirator is made of fine gauze or wire, and is worn over the nose and mouth. Such devices are frequently used by laborers who are compelled to work in smoke or dust.

In a recent letter from Montreal to a friend it is learned that Miss Bessie Louison (who has spent the last six months in Montreal) has successfully passed examinations in a course of first aid to the injured. Miss Bessie is expected to return to Charlottetown next week. SENTENCE OF DEATH IN GERMANY ON A BRITISH PRISONER BERLIN, April, 28.—The supreme military court has confirmed the sentence of death imposed on December 28 of William Lonsdale, of Leeds, England private in the British army, for attacking a German non-commissioned officer at the military prison camp at Doberitz. The verdict of the court is subject to the approval of Emperor William, and the sentence possibly will be commuted. Ronald B. Heavry, second secretary of the United States embassy, attended the session of the court. Dr. Henry Van Dyke, the United States minister at The Hague, and James W. Gerard, the United States ambassador to Germany, both took an interest in the case of Lonsdale at the behest of the Lord Mayor of Leeds, who sought to have the death sentence or the soldier commuted. In February it was announced that the court had commuted the sentence to twenty years imprisonment. Later a despatch from Berlin stated that Lonsdale had obtained another appeal and that the case will be heard before the supreme military court, April 27.

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
