Henry Wilbert Hugstalis, whose
next of kin is his father, Jacob
Hugstalis, Montreal. The men, all
under 30 years of age, were killed
instantly by the cause of the crash
which came after the bomber had
been flying an hour, was not
learned. They were attached to the
Mount Pleasant Airport. It was
the first fatal accident since the

January 17, when coupon rationing
of the product becomes effective.
The announcement said the
"freeze" boxes and ration tickets for
distribution of stocks from
Pacific coast canneries to the
trade, although it might not be
possible to supply all retailers by
that date.

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Busy Year For
Maritime Region
Of The C.N.R.

By J. F. Pringle, Vice-President
and General Manager, Atlantic
Region, Canadian National Rail-
way.
The heavy volume of war traffic
that now rolls over the Atlantic
Region of the Canadian National
Railway, which serves the Marit-
ime Provinces and the Island of
Prince Edward Island, is a direct
result of the war effort.
Since the war began, enormous
quantities of munitions and sup-
plies have moved over the rails of
the Canadian National System en-
route to sea-board to be carried to
the battle fronts, as well as thou-
sands of members of the armed
forces. There is also a consider-
able amount of "back traffic" and
that all this enormous traffic has been
handled so expeditiously is a great
tribute to the splendid efforts that
Canadian National employees are
making in helping Canada to make
effort and to achieve victory for
the United Nations.

Another factor in the expeditious
handling of this traffic are the im-
provements that have been made
in equipment and operating facili-
ties.
The Atlantic Region of the Cana-
dian National Railways is called
upon to handle the bulk of the
coal and steel production in the
Maritime Provinces and this
represents no mean proportion
of the total traffic. A great portion
of the coal going to central Cana-
da to keep the wheels of the war
factories turning out munitions.
The steel finds its way into the
raw material for manufacturing
guns, shells and tanks in Canadian
factories as well as in steel ships
turned out from Canadian ship-
yards. In addition some of it goes
overseas in the form of billets.
Agricultural products also form a
considerable portion of the traffic
moving over the rails of the Cana-
dian National in the Maritimes,
which serve the ports of Halifax
and Sydney, in Nova Scotia, and
Saint John, in New Brunswick, and
also Prince Edward Island.

Increased Traffic
Since the war the establishment
of navy, army and air force train-
ing camps and service bases in
the Maritimes has brought about
a greatly increased volume of
passenger traffic. In addition there
is a considerable volume of supplies
moving into these centres, the
great bulk of which is carried by
rail.
The volume of freight and pas-
senger travel over the lines of
the Canadian National has in-
creased in other industries. To
offset this, use has been made of
women on the Canadian National
System as much as possible. They
are employed in roundhouses as
locomotive cleaners and at terminals as car
cleaners, where they are doing good
work. Notwithstanding the short-
age of male help, 17,025 men from
all departments, railway, express,
telegraph, hotels and marine ser-
vice, have been trained and
dressed in the uniform of the various
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The marine services of the Cana-
dian National System are carry-
ing on valiantly notwithstanding
the loss of three of their "Lady
Hawkins", "Lady Somers", "Lady
Hawkins" and "Lady Drake", by
torpedoes from submarines.
The "Lady Nelson", queen of the
line, is now a hospital ship, the
first to be operated by Canada.
The ship's crew is made up of
officers and men of the Canadian
National Steamships.

Other activities of the Canadian
National System include the manu-
facture of guns by a subsidiary,
National Railways Munitions Ltd.,
Montreal, and the building of
steamships on the Pacific Coast,
which were so urgently needed in
overcoming the submarine menace.
