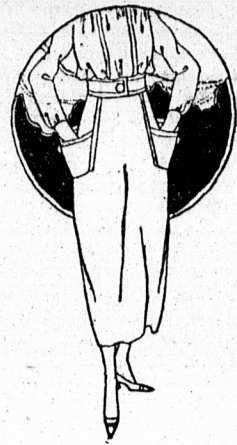

ENGLISH FOOD PRICES HIGHER THAN CANADIAN

While the cost of living in Great Britain is declining, it is an error to suppose that prices in the majority of foodstuffs are yet down on the level where they can be reasonably compared with Canadian prices in the same classes. The British Food Controller has just discontinued the retail control of Caerphilly cheese, a standard middle-class British product and has fixed the following maximum prices to the producers:

Caerphilly whole milk... 31c per lb. Partly skimmed, containing 25 per cent fat... 28c per lb. Wholly skimmed with less than 25 per cent fat... 16c per lb. To these prices must be added the eventual cost of distribution and profits of wholesaler and retailer before the price to the consumer can be obtained. Comparison is well in favor of Canadian prices.

A HINT TO SHEEP MEN

While all kinds of live stock products bring the farmer higher prices than in pre-war times, probably none has shown such an advance as those of the sheep flock. One result is a considerable increase in the sheep population of the Maritime Provinces. No one need be afraid of over-doing it. There is abundant room in the fields and barns of these provinces for a vast increase yet, as well as a very ready market for wool and mutton.

With the revival of interest in the sheep industry has come an improved system of marketing the wool. Last year approximately 80,000 lbs. of wool from Nova Scotia alone were sold through the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Ltd., and on the average those who marketed their wool through this organization realized 10c per pound more than those who sold in the ordinary way.

Plans are now being laid by this association for a much larger business this year. Depots for the buying and shipment of wool will be established at advantageous points all over Nova Scotia. The director of the enterprise for Nova Scotia is Mr. S. A. Logan, of Amherst. The Canadian Co-operative bought wool last year in every province of the Dominion and will doubtless do likewise this year on a still larger scale.

There is some uncertainty, of course, as to the price wool will bring this year. Probably it will be slightly lower than last year, but in any case it will be far above pre-war prices. It will pay owners of sheep to keep in touch with the co-operative representative in their district. Information may be had at any time from Mr. S. A. Logan, Amherst, N. S., The N. S. BOLSHEVIK PLOT FRUSTRATED

LONDON, June 3.—A Russian Bolshevik plot on a wide scale has been discovered in Finland, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen. Many arrests have been made in connection with the discovery.

Several million marks had been smuggled into Finland preparatory to a contemplated revolution, the telegram states, and a Bolshevik representative at Helsingfors had distributed more than three million marks of this. Quantities of weapons had been given out among the unemployed, but the coup d'etat that was planned was postponed "owing to

Reds Occupy Kherson

A wireless received here from Moscow says that Kherson, on the Dnieper, northeast of Odessa, was occupied by the Reds on Friday afternoon after fierce fighting. The Bolsheviks have been faced with an insurrection in the Southern Ukraine and the forces defeated at Kherson probably were Ukrainians, who had revolted against the Soviets. It was reported last week that a counter revolt had been begun in the Odessa region by Grigoroff, a former Bolshevik General.

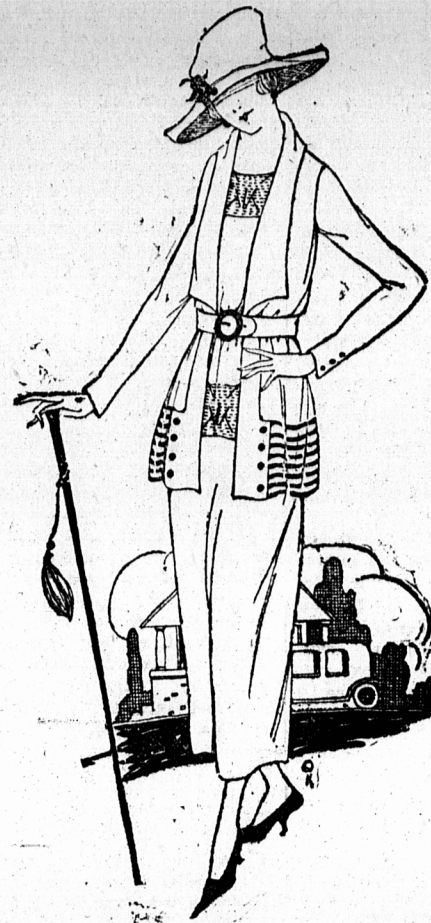
