### Aid Given Franco Spain Pays Hitler No Dividends



Spain's Franco makes plans, but they don't help Germany's Hitler.

LONDON, March 29—Perhaps the greatest disappointment to Nazi Germany and the greatest relief to Britain and France has been the cool, aloof attitude of Franco Spain.

Hitler counted on two things from Spain: 1. Regardless of British sea power, he hoped Germany would get iron ore, copper and mercury from Spain in payment for war supplies. General Franco received from Germany during the civil war.

2. He believed General Franco would adopt such an equivocal, if not semi-hostile attitude, that Franco would find it necessary to divert several hundred thousand troops to watch the frontier between France and Spain.

On Hitler's expectations were not without good ground. He had intervened in the civil war on Franco's side after signing a non-intervention agreement with Britain and France. His Condor Legion air squadrons, and technicians played a considerable part in fighting the republican government of Madrid.

SOVIET PACT ALEVINATED SPAIN In January, 1939, Franco made a cultural agreement with Germany, so that, by study, each nation would have a closer and friendlier knowledge of the other. In April, 1939, Franco signed the anti-Comintern pact.

So Franco was shocked beyond measure at news that Hitler and Stalin had signed a pact. Then Franco had his next surprise, for France dissolved the Communist party, as it entered the war, and suppressed Red activities. France sent an ambassador to Spain Marshal Petain, the hero of Verdun, who is well-liked in Spain and who smoothed the way to closer relations.

The old-time friendship between Spain and Britain was also resumed. Britain has always been the principal buyer of Spanish oranges and sherry.

THE new Palangist paper, "Alcazar," organized a reception to the Finnish minister to show Spanish sympathy for Finland's cause.

Just before the European war started, the Germans organized a trading monopoly to get minerals Germany needs. Part of this was to be in payment for German war material furnished during the civil war. Part was to have been paid for by the barter system.

There was a fleet of German freighters in Spanish ports ready for loading. They are still huddling there. Many of them have no cargo because the war has put a stop to the whole trading scheme. Apparently, no new Spanish minerals will go into German shells.

### Race Horse Case Against C.N.R. Is Dropped

TORONTO, April 3—Announcement has been made by the Canadian National Railways that notice has been served by William F. Morrissey, that the action commenced by him in the Supreme Court for damages arising out of the alleged negligence of the Canadian National Railway Co. in unloading the race horse "Bunty Lawless" at Chicago, on September 7th, 1939, has been discontinued. Under the practice of the court, Mr. Morrissey will be obliged to pay the costs entailed by the railway in defence of his action.

The official statement issued by the Canadian National Railways is as follows: "The Canadian National Railways Company received notice to show cause why it should not be held liable for the injury to the race horse 'Bunty Lawless' at Chicago, on September 7th, 1939, which was caused by the negligence of the company in unloading the horse from the express car in which it was transported. The company has been advised by its legal counsel that it is highly improper that any statement be made or published by the company while litigation is pending. Now that this litigation has been discontinued by the

owner of "Bunty Lawless," the railways desires that its position be made clear by a statement of the facts, as signed by witnesses in Chicago, showing the manner in which the owner's attendants treated this valuable race horse. These statements have been previously shown to Mr. Morrissey's solicitor.

### EARRINGS GALORE

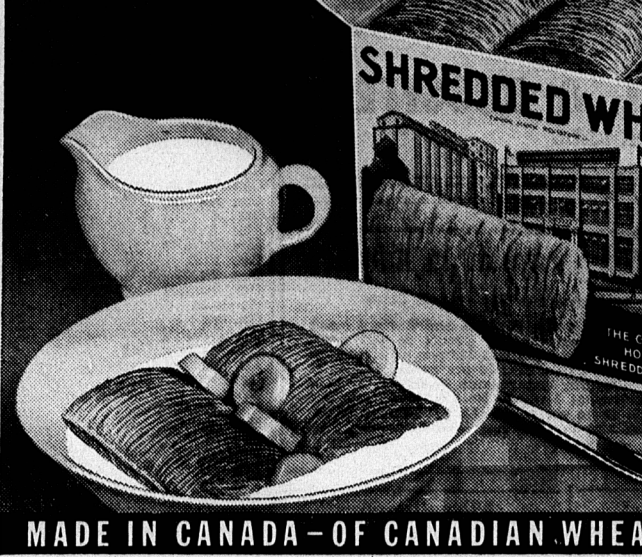

### AIRPORT GOES SOUTH OF BORDER

CHICPEE, Mass., March 30—(CP)—Neither snow, ice nor below-zero temperature has stopped

the United States Army in its preparation of 4,200 acres of land bordering on the Connecticut River for a gigantic air base to safeguard the northeast from air attack from Europe.

Already 1,500 men are busy clearing off brush and trees and soon will rise a community of 400 houses, an apartment building, barracks theatre and office buildings, with hangars, shops and runways sufficient to meet the needs of the U. S. Army's only New English air base.

Admittedly one of the chief factors in locating the base in this area was the idea of making the Army's air resources available in any attempt from overseas to invade Canada or the United States by sea or air. The base, to be known as Westover Field is to accommodate at least 1,000 Army planes. The Chicopee district is about 225 miles south of the Quebec-Vermont border. Under the \$3,613,000 already allocated for building and the \$270,000 earmarked for land purchases, the Army's engineers will erect four hangars, a hangar base, communications buildings, photographic laboratory, hospital heating plant, storehouses, fire and guard houses, and temporary barracks. This initial appropriation will take care of clearing

land, drainage, installing water supply, sewers, a spur rail-road track to Chicopee, oil and gas storage facilities, and other essentials. It will also provide the 54,000 square feet of concrete aprons needed and the runways ranging from 4,000 to 8,000 feet in length.

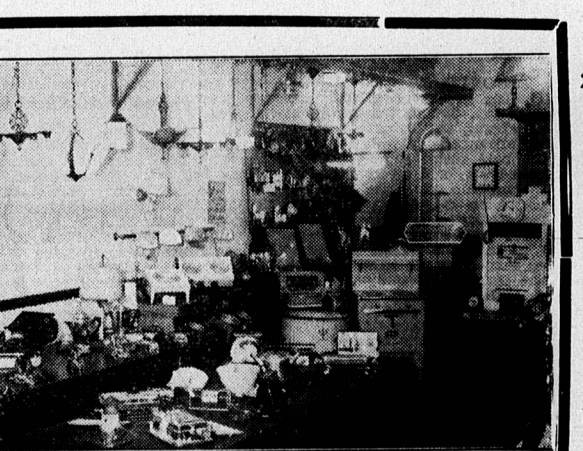
