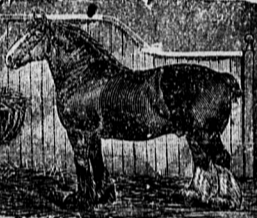

Current Comment

Having made that statement before a large meeting of his constituents, this small pretense is no justification for his going only two days later, as he now admits, and becoming a party to its violation.

Mr. Higgs then turned his attention to the permanent roads, joining in the chorus of adulation and mutual admiration because of these great benefits to the province. Answering those who had declared that it was the Federal Government that inaugurated the scheme and made the work possible, AFTER THE LIBERAL SENATE HAD FIRST DEFEATED THE BILL, he sought to expulate his Liberal co-obstructionists at Ottawa by declaring that it "was intended" that that money should be used to corrupt and buy up the electorate. When did Mr. Higgs become endowed with that almighty perception to enable him to determine the "intention" of Sir Robert Borden and those great statesmen behind him, and to declare that they were sinister and corrupt? And on what authority does he assume that such of the leading Liberals of Canada, as Premiers Murray of N. S., Gouin of Quebec, Martin of Saskatchewan and Sifton of Alberta, and the other Premiers of the Dominion would be participants in this species of corruption? In due course the Senate became Conservative and, despite this Liberal opposition, the Highways Act became law.

And now after opposing it tooth and nail at Ottawa, and in this province declaring it to be "AN INFERNAL SCHEME INVOLVING THE PROVINCE IN HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS, PERHAPS MILLIONS," they are crowing most lustily over its great advantages, seeking to absorb to themselves the credit, and attempting, instead of praising, to slander its originators. And it would look in this connection as if Mr. Higgs was anticipating an early election, if not for the whole party, perhaps in his own individual case, for with that old time political foresight he indulged in a catering for the masses. He would have "a fair wage scale" embodied in all government contracts, "pensions for caretakers" in Falconwood and public institutions, no more "collection of Poll Taxes from bosses," which he denounced as wrong in principle, and a remission of the tax upon jobsters. It is well to be fore-sighted and preparing for a possible emergency, but there is a something which he should not overlook, and that is the strong suspicion which for the future the country, especially those who have voted at their disposal, continue to entertain towards promises emanating from any portion of the local government connections of today.

It is also had something to say on the permanency of roads and illustrated his ideas by referring to the approaches to Charlottetown, built over forty years ago, which, in similitude to the Appian Way, were still credit to the Government that built them. And with the usual tendency to purloin all past glory for their party he declares these approaches were "built by a Liberal Government." And he did this after it had been pointed out only a few days ago, in answer to a similar mistake made by the Premier, THAT THE DAVIES GOVERNMENT WAS NOT LIBERAL, BUT A COALITION. To class Hon. D. Gordon, Senator Samuel Prowse, Hon. Geo. W. DeBlois, Hon. John Yeo (then a Conservative), members and supporters of that Government, as Liberals, would be an insult to their memory's. Added to this their outside support in the election campaign, including their strongest speakers were Conservatives of the most pronounced type, such men for instance as T. Heath Haviland, George W. Millner, D. H. MacKinnon, John P. Tanton, and others equally strong who have since gone to their reward. It is behind the cloaks of such staunch Conservatives as these that both Premier Bell and Mr. Higgs would shield the mistaken Liberalism in the local arena of today.

First recover damages from the Federal Government for the alterations, and then "scrap that institution." The money had no right to be returned to the donor, but should be held by the Government and used for the benefit of tubercular patients in such manner as they thought best. As a good Methodist Mr. Higgs should be acquainted with the decision of the Court of Chancery in the Methodist School case, directing that the funds must be used as intended by the contributors, resulting in its investment in the Kindergarten School. The Sanatorium is more strongly entrenched behind this decision, in that its destiny has been secured by the most solemn of written bonds, under seal, as admitted by the Premier, binding the good faith of this province to maintain the institution for which the

gift was made. Perhaps Mr. Higgs may constitute himself a court of appeal from that decision, and as Premier Bell has already assumed to be, above all law and all bonds in the matter, and declared that the government absolutely refuse to stand by the bond or carry out the agreement.

WESTERN FARMERS BUSY SOWING IN BIG WHEAT FIELDS

The first seeding of any considerable amount of land in the Edmonton district started Tuesday on the farm of J. W. Huff, southeast of Onaway. Mr. Huff is placing 170 acres in wheat and oats and expects with present favorable weather conditions, to finish seeding within ten days. Seeding on the Huff farm is six weeks in advance of 1920, and two weeks ahead of 1919.
