amount after that. It is necessary that the meat should be ground and mixed with cereals and vegetables. We would warn fox breeders against feeding the meat at which milk is being fed to the pups. If milk is fed in the morning meal, the meat should be then fed at the evening meal. Also we would warn fox breeders against feeding meat in chunks to pups under seven months old as it is very liable to lead to acute indigestion.

Question: Is cow's milk too rich for pups one month old? Should any water be added to it?

We would warn fox breeders against adding water to cow's milk when it is fed to pups. When large quantities of cow's milk is fed to pups they make a very rapid growth for the first two weeks, but milk by itself will lead to severe stomach disturbances, generally resulting in hemorrhages of the stomach and the growth stops after two weeks and the pups become real sick. The fact that the pups made a rapid growth at first on milk has led a large number of fox breeders to believe that cow's milk was too rich and it was the richness of the milk that was causing the trouble, whereas in actuality is not nearly as rich as vixen's milk, but it forms an entirely different clot. When milk enters the stomach, there is present in the stomach of all animals a secretion that causes the milk to clot. The curd produced by the vixen's milk is granular in consistency and is very friable, readily breaks up and passes from the stomach into the intestines where it is mostly digested. On the other hand, cow's milk forms a hard cheesy clot and when fed to fox pups is entirely digested in the stomach as the clot is too tough to pass from the stomach to the intestines before it is digested. In other words, the vixen's milk is specially concocted for the young foxes whose digestion takes place mostly in the intestines. On the other hand, the cow's milk is specially concocted for calves whose digestion takes place mostly in the stomach. If water should be added to the cow's milk, it only makes the curd tougher and harder to digest and will lead to more trouble than the milk by itself. Therefore, it is better to avoid adding water to cow's milk, but we would recommend that bread or some other cereal should always be added to milk so that when it gets into the stomach of the pup it will be well incorporated with the other food and would not have the opportunity of making the hard cheesy clot, which would occur if the milk were fed by itself or if a mixture of water and milk were fed.

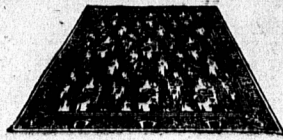

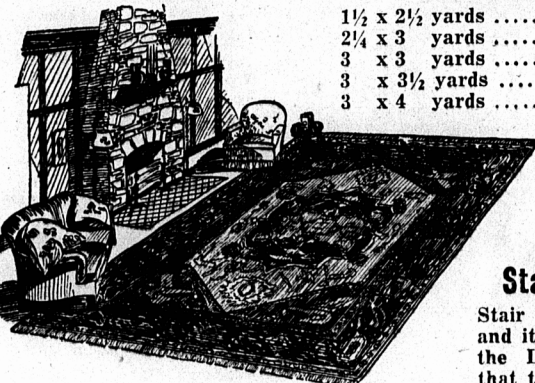

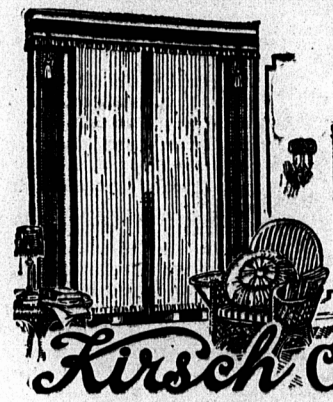
