Smythe absent From Governors' Board meeting

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(CP)—Conny Smythe, manager of Toronto Maple Leafs, did not attend today's meeting of the National Hockey League Board of Governors, and his associates told newspapermen that Conny is about to go into uniform and will be seen little in hockey circles for the rest of the season.

It was understood that Smythe, an aviator in the last war, will be attached to the Canadian artillery. Smythe was reported to be in Ottawa today.

Smythe still Looking for a Job in army

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—(CP)—Manager Conny Smythe of Toronto Maple Leafs said tonight he'd join the army "anytime they give me a job"—but in the meantime he's going back to Toronto to see the Leafs win a hockey game.

Smythe, a veteran of the first great war, missed today's meeting of the National Hockey League Board of Governors in New York and it was thought in some quarters he might quit hockey for the season, at least.

"I've been in the game a long time and I'm not ready to quit until I get a chance to join the army," he said.

Zivic also Victory hungry

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Fritz Zivic said today there's no reason you can expect him to give up his world welterweight championship to Henry Armstrong in Madison Square Garden Friday night, just because Henry is supposed to have an extra-special incentive to win.

"If you're talking about reason for winning," said the youngest of the five flying Zivics of Pittsburgh, "then don't go any farther than little Fritzie."

"And you're telling me Armstrong is convinced he's gonna win because he wants to retire as champion, is that right, despite the money I've made since winning the title. I'm still a hungry fighter. Fritzie is through as a ham-and-egger."

Vice - Admiral Cunningham Is promoted

LONDON, Jan. 15.—(CP)—Vice-Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham, commander-in-chief of the British Mediterranean fleet, and Vice-Admiral Sir Max Horton, head of the British submarine service, have been promoted to the rank of Admiral, the Admiralty announced tonight. Cunningham had been an acting admiral.

Admiral Cunningham, born in 1888, entered the navy in 1908 and received the Distinguished Service Order with two bars in the first great war. He was naval aide-de-camp to the late King George V, in 1922, and later was assigned as Rear Admiral to command the destroyer flotilla with the Mediterranean fleet. He was promoted to vice-admiral commanding the cruiser squadron in 1937 and in 1939 was put in command of the Mediterranean fleet.

Admiral Horton entered the navy in 1900 and was a submarine commander in the first great war. He commanded the German light cruiser Sela at Heligoland and the German cruiser Prinz Adalbert in the Baltic as well as three German destroyers and several merchant ships. For his service he was rewarded with the D.S.O. and two bars. He was made a vice-admiral in 1936.

Both men were knighted in 1939.

Greenberg will Be in army By June 1st

DETROIT, Jan. 15.—(AP)—A selective official said today Hank Greenberg, Detroit Tiger outfielder and most valuable American Baseball League player last year, "probably will be in the army by June 1st."

W. H. Wells, chief clerk of draft board no. 23, said Greenberg, who holds order no. 621, would be mailed a draft questionnaire "within two or three weeks."

"If the number of draftees into the army continues at the present rate," Wells said, "Greenberg probably will be called sometime in May and hardly later than June 1st."

Praises exploits Of Polish Navy

LONDON, Jan. 15.—(CP Cable)—Ernest Bevin, Minister of Labor and National Service, said today at the opening of a Polish employment agency: "We are proud of the exploits, of the courage of the Polish navy, army, air force and mercantile marine, and know that though the enemy has taken your territory and imposed their will upon it, they have not conquered Poland and the Polish people. Creation of this international labor force will, I believe, have a very big influence in the greater conception of unity when peace comes to be made."

Gen. Wladislaw Sikorski, Premier of the Polish government-in-exile, replied that the Poland of the future will not be shut up inside her 1939 frontiers.

"She will have a start on a new road of co-operation with her neighbors to help organize a bloc sufficiently strong to resist any repetition of the recent catastrophe. I have no doubt that British democracy will save world civilization and will free Europe from the nightmare of Hitler's new order," he said.

The Polish Minister of Labor said that when the Poles will be back in a free Poland they will never forget Britain's hearty hospitality, and especially being allowed to fight in the ranks of their own Polish army, and to work in factories alongside the British people.

MOTHER, AGED 30 HAS 11 CHILDREN

DANZIG, Germany, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Eleven children at 33 years of age work in a record of Frau Margaret Bieda, wife of a laborer. She has been "rewarded the Nazis' golden mother" cross. Three sets of twins all girls, and five other children, make up the family. Hitler was named sponsor for the latest twins.

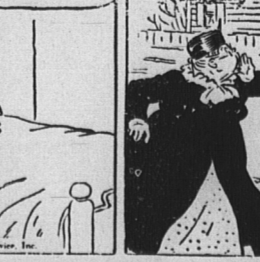
