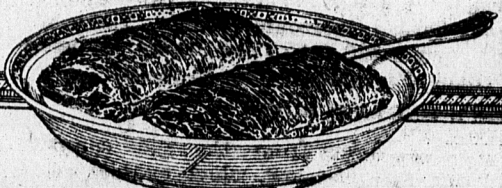

The Dominion bureau of statistics announces that the total yield of wheat in Canada, for 1920 is now finally returned as 263,189,300 bushels from 18,232,374 acres, as compared with 193,260,400 bushels from 19,125,968 acres in 1918 and with 354,480,440 bushels from 16,342,969 acres, the annual average for the five years 1915-1916.

Chamber of Deputies Make Statement

PARIS, Jan. 20. - The Ministerial declaration Chamber of Deputies tomorrow will say that the Government will strive to obtain the Execution of Versailles Treaty without recourse to violence if the German Government is disposed to disarm and pay reparations. The cabinet tonight is to put the finishing touches on the document. In regards to the Russian declaration they will say the French government, while permitting Frenchmen to trade freely will not resume relations with the Soviet Government so long as it abstains from giving guarantees that it is ready to respect the free expression and will of the Russian people and international engagements preceding the Russian governments.

Cause of Difference Between Balloonists

ROCKAWAY, Jan. 20. - Lieut. Walter Hinton, testifying yesterday afternoon at the inquiry into the spectacular balloon flight he recently made into Canada with two other United States Naval officers, declared at one time while they lost the woods he had consulted his Commander regarding the advisability of disarming Lieut. Stephen A. Farrell. It was a letter from Lieut. Hinton to his wife stating that Lieut. Farrell begged his companions to cut his throat and use his body for food and press on, that led to a fist fight between Hinton and Farrell, at Mattice, after they trekked out of the North and Farrell had learned of the publication of the letter.

MANY CHINESE JOBLESS.

Vancouver's Chinatown has something like 3,500 jobless denizens. Victoria counts about 1,800 unemployed Chinese. Scattered throughout other parts of British Columbia, including New Westminster, there are about 2,500 workless Chinese. These men are practically laborers and do not include cooks, or other craftsmen whose number may be set at 3,500.
