CLEANING UP OYSTER AREAS

Beds will be Stocked at Richmond Bay. Increase in Lobster and Other Fisheries Reported.

The establishment of demonstration oyster farms in Richmond Bay has been undertaken by the Federal Department of Fisheries and a considerable amount of work has been done this summer, especially near Curtain Island, where an area of 100 acres has been cleaned. 100 barrels of matured oysters will be placed in this area next spring. An area in Grand River, known as Gillis Point bed, has also been cleaned and is now being stocked with both matured and small oysters.

Prospects Bright
The work that has been going on this summer, especially in the collection of spat, has been a marked success.

U. S. Extends Recognition to Chinese Govt.

There will be no formal announcement of this important action, officials said, unless Nanking asks that it be given in honor of the officers of the Secretary of State Kellogg within a few days may issue an informal statement revealing the official position the United States now takes.

Heir to Throne Weds Daughter of Ex-Ambassador

TOKYO, Sept. 28.—Prince Chichibu, heir-presumptive to the Japanese throne, and Miss Setsuko Matsudaira, daughter of Japan's former ambassador to Washington, were married at the Imperial Palace this morning. The kashikodoko or "palace of awe," the sanctuary in the imperial palace, where the sun goddess is worshipped as the maternal ancestress of the imperial house of Japan, was the scene of the wedding.

PRIVY COUNCIL TO DECIDE QUESTION

One of the Most Important Questions to Come Before the Courts in Years Will be Argued Next Week in the Supreme Court of Canada and Later Carried to the Highest Court in the British Empire.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 28.—Dominion and provincial rights to water powers will be argued in the Supreme Court of Canada next week. Recognized as one of the most important questions with far-reaching ramifications which has come before the courts in years the case will be carried to the Privy Council in England for final adjudication.

Development of the potential water powers of the St. Lawrence, international and interprovincial in character, development of water power on the Ottawa river and a number of other power projects, all these are vitally concerned in the points to be decided respecting federal and provincial jurisdiction. The case will probably extend over two weeks.

Hearing of argument is scheduled to open here on Tuesday morning next with an eminent array of counsel present armed with voluminous briefs. The Dominion government and at least five of the provinces, Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, will be represented.

The whole matter is an outgrowth of the provincial premiers' conference held at Ottawa in November last. At this conference Premier G. Howard Ferguson, of Ontario and Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec, particularly questioned the right of the Dominion to water powers created or made available by the erection of Dominion works for the improvement of navigation. The provincial representatives further asserted a right on the part of the provinces to such water powers within the limits of the province. The discussion resulted in a decision to refer the question of legislative control over and proprietary interest in water powers to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Water powers incidental to navigation is the main issue, with the question of the Dominion's right of navigation also involved. In brief the contention of the Dominion government will be that when powers are developed from works which it constructs to aid navigation the Dominion owns such surplus powers.

Campaign to Abolish Passports

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 28.—Passports for British born travellers going from one part of the Empire to another will not be needed if the campaign for their abolition, which will be conducted by the Canadian Steamship and Tourist Agents which at a meeting yesterday decided to undertake the campaign which they feel will give the proper support by the public will result in a much freer passage between British countries for British people.

Prince and His Brother Arrive in Kenya

MOMBASA, Kenya Colony, East Africa, Sept. 28.—The Prince of Gloucester, arrived today on the steamship, beginning a good will tour of the British African colonies. It was the Duke of Gloucester's first visit to Africa and on the tour he will have his first experience hunting big game. All the ships in the harbor were decked with bunting as the ship arrived at Kilindini, across a bridge from Mombasa where a large crowd assembled to greet their royal travellers.

Previous to the docking of the vessel Sir Edward Grigg, Governor of Kenya, had sent a wireless message of welcome. The Princes replied that they were looking forward to the visit to the colony. They will stay at the government house here for two days as the guests of the Governor and Lady Grigg.

To overcome this obstacle Miss Matsudaira was adopted by her uncle, Viscount Morio Matsudaira, so that he could act as her father at the wedding.

BOOKS ARE STILL DELAYED

Local Teachers Discuss Shortage at Meeting Yesterday.

At the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Teachers Institute, which was opened yesterday morning in Rochford Square School, a lively discussion took place as to the delay in the new text books, some of which were not available, although nearly a month had passed since the Schools were opened.

Several of the teachers expressed very decided opinions about the difficulty of attempting to teach Canadian History with only a very few of the prescribed text books available. Mr. H. H. Shaw, the Chief Superintendent of Education, in answer to their obligations, told them they should teach the subject, not the text, and that it did not much matter what text they used provided this was done.

CRISIS IN AUSTRALIA

500 Police Despatched to Waterfront Where Strikers Beat Up Volunteer Workers.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Sept. 28.—As an outcome of the riotous behaviour of 2,000 striking waterside workers in Port Adelaide yesterday, the Governor of South Australia, which is run by a labor administration, today issued a proclamation that a national crisis exists. Five hundred special police, drilled by army officers and armed with rifles, were despatched to the waterfront, where yesterday the strikers "beat up" a number of volunteer workers.

The inflamed unionists had another encounter with the police today and a score or so were struck with batons.

Prime Minister Bruce, of Australia, referring to the scenes of lawlessness said the government was determined to ensure a continuation of the Maritime services at the other ports. Meanwhile, overseas and a few inter-state vessels are having their cargo moved without trouble by union or volunteer labor. At Sydney, the unionists are ignoring the labor council's instructions to boycott vessels employing free labor.

New Vice Regal Residence
