Pork was brisk at eight to nine cents per lb. The market was dull, oats selling at fifty to fifty one cts. per bush for white and fifty to fifty two for black. Butter sold at twenty-two to twenty-four cents per lb, while eggs brought seventeen to eighteen cents per doz.

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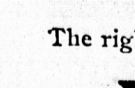
