John Dals Co, 107 Fulton Market, New York, buyers of smelts and eels in this Province, as will be seen by their ad elsewhere, write The Guardian that smelts are in demand on the American market and that they bring from ten to twenty cents according to size and quality.

The daily average circulation of the Guardian, for week ending December 4th was 7303 copies a day. The circulation of The Guardian is greater than that of all the other daily newspapers on Prince Edward Island combined, including the Semi-weekly Patriot. Attention is called to the statement in another column.

The old Colonial Tea and Bazaar which was held last afternoon and evening in St Peter's Schoolroom was well patronized. The room was very prettily decorated for the occasion and the large number who partook of the many good things offered were well pleased with the efforts of those in charge.

It will be good news to the people of this Province, who ship smelts to U. S. markets, to know that the duty on same when "fresh" or "frozen" has been lowered to but three quarters of a cent per pound, and thus all such should always be billed as "frozen" whether shipped in small or large quantities. Smelts which are packed in ice are regarded as "preserved" rather than "fresh" or "frozen" and when thus shipped in packages of less than one hundred pounds the duty is thirty per cent ad valorem. The above reduction is the result of the efforts of a committee of which J. A. Rich of J. A. Rich & Co, Boston, was a member he being chosen by the Wholesale Commission Fish Dealers of that city.
