Two World's Records Equalled By Hobbs In Cricket Match

TAUNTON, Somersetshire, Eng., Aug. 18.—Joy burned in the hearts of Britishers throughout the world today for mighty Jack Hobbs, the Babe Ruth of cricket, has scored his 12th "century," thus equaling the world's record set by Dr. W. G. Grace in 1904. A "century" is 100 runs in an innings.

Britain's king of swat also equalled another record, that of scoring 13 centuries in a single season.

The feat had previously been accomplished by C. B. Fry, T. Hayward and E. Henderson.

Dr. Grace, who was known as "the greatest cricketer of all time," made his record over a period of forty years, while Hobbs has only been playing since 1905.

Thousands saw him equal the record. When the game was adjourned Saturday night, he had only nine runs to make, and special trains were found necessary to transport all the enthusiasts from London, and other cities desiring to see him complete the tying "century."

Battling Siki In Trouble Again

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Battling Siki, Senegalese light-heavyweight boxer, came in conflict with the law again today. He was arrested on complaint of immigration officers for overstaying his six months' permit in this country, and was released in \$1,000 bail, pending a hearing Friday.

Peter Manning Establishes New World's Record

CLEVELAND, Aug. 17.—Racing in a brisk wind in the back stretch and with but only one competitor over the distance, Peter Manning, world's champion trotter, established a new world's trotting record for two miles in an exhibition at North Randall Saturday. His time of 4:10 1-5 clips five full seconds off the American record set by The Harvester at Lexington, Ky., in October, 1910.

Peter Manning's performance was the feature of the combat with Single G., but Single G.'s best effort was second to Margaret Dillon in the free-for-all pace. The fifteen-year-old pacer stepped a mile in two minutes flat, the fastest time of the year on the local track to win the second heat, but went into a break half way around in the third and finished a bad last.

Attempt Channel Swim This Morning

CAP GRIS NEZ, France, Aug. 18.—Gertrude Ederle rested today in preparation for her great trial tomorrow, when she will endeavor to swim from this headland through the swiftness of the channel to Dover. If she succeeds she will be the first woman swimmer to conquer this arm of the Atlantic.

Miss Ederle plans to strike off at 7.45 a.m. A short distance out she will be joined by the tug La Marthe, bearing a party of other famous swimmers, among them Tom Burgess, of England, who negotiated the channel swim in 1911, and her own trainer, Jabez Wolfe. To cheer her on her way, the tug will also carry a four-piece jazz band.

Miss Ederle is brimful of confidence and declares she is in the most perfect physical condition she ever attained. Her confidence is not shared by her trainer, Wolfe, who complains that he has really been allowed very little to say as to her training methods.

Test To Find Why U. S. Golfers Excel

LONDON, Aug. 18.—A unique tournament for the purpose of finding out "what's wrong with British golf as compared to the American" will take place at Moor Park Club, near London, on Aug. 28-18 under the auspices of The London Evening Standard, which is offering \$5,000 in prizes.

The paper explains that as professionals "experience little or no difficulty with the drive" for the purposes of this tournament tee shots will be eliminated. On each hole the players will drop balls in the fairway on a line where a good drive would ordinarily land and from there will play to the greens in the usual fashion.

The test thus arranged, on the theory that it is at approaching and putting where British golfers succumb to the Americans, will be carried out by seventy prominent players to be selected by The Evening Standard.
