TUESDAY.

A RHODES SCHOLAR.—Sgt. A. L. Collett, Springfield, Rhodes Scholar from King's College is among the volunteers for active service at the front. Sgt. Collett, only recently returned from England, where he was attached to the Territorials. He is in a position to join his regiment in England but prefers to go with the Canadians, and so has volunteered as a member of the 82nd Regiment.

ENTERTAINED AT LUNCHEON.—The members of the Royal Trade Commission and staff with the witnesses who were examined before them, together with a number of prominent business men, were entertained yesterday afternoon at a luncheon at which Hon. Premier Matheson presided and His Honor Judge Stewart acted as croupier. The luncheon was given in the Prince of Wales College Hall and was an excellent repast well served, the caterer being Mrs. McKinnon.

THE CIRCUS.—The old jail square wore a brilliant appearance last night, hundreds of persons pushing one another in the eager attempt to obtain access to the tents of the J. H. Eschman circus. Three excellent shows were given, beginning at half-past seven, when in the smaller tent, which was crowded, "the Joasses" sang comic songs, clever sleight-of-hand tricks were performed, and "Professor" Hall, an animal trainer of rare talent, treated the spectators to some marvelous sights. A pretty little black dog was made to spell his name (how need not be explained here) and to discriminate between colors. "The floating woman" was a sight worth seeing and it set inquisitive people thinking. In the main tent two very good performances were given. Several ponies were put through a series of interesting and fascinating feats, "flying" acrobats did dangerous things, a juggler with praiseworthy dexterity and an unusual exhibition of strength was given by a man who balanced great weights on his chin. The contortionist was also good. Undoubtedly the attraction was Nemo, a well-trained and almost sensible elephant which "dined" with its master. The shows were altogether good.

VISITING FOX RANCHES.—A number of fox ranches in the vicinity of Charlottetown were visited yesterday afternoon by the members of the Dominion Royal Trade Commission at the conclusion of their labors here. They drove first to the Experimental Station, where they made a brief stay. From there the party drove to the J. R. Dennis ranch at Mount Edward, and there they were shown not only the famous silver black in all his regal state, but also the famed Karakule sheep. Naturally, the visitors were greatly interested in all they saw. From the Dennis ranch, some of the party went over to the Provincial Ranch and went over that fine property. Returning to the city, the party were entertained at tea by Judge and Mrs. W. S. Stewart. Afterwards some of them visited the Upton and Spring Park fox ranches, where they had further opportunities of inspecting both black foxes and Karakule sheep. The visits were of the utmost interest and of considerable pleasure to the visitors. The Commissioners leave the city by this morning's express on their way to Quebec, where they will shortly embark for the Old Country.

WEDDING BELLS.—A pretty wedding took place in Notre Dame Academy at 6.30 o'clock yesterday morning, when Miss Georgie Brothers of Vernon River became the bride of Mr. Philip Hughes of Mill Cove. Rev. Frank McQuaid performed the ceremony, about thirty invited guests being present. The bride was attended by her sister and the groom by his brother. After the ceremony the newly wedded couple left on the express of a wedding trip to Montreal.

PROPER ADDRESSES NECESSARY.—The Postmaster desires to call the attention of all persons sending and receiving mail matter to the great importance of having it fully and properly addressed, whether it is intended for delivery by letter carriers or through a Post Office Box. It is only the work of a moment to put on the street and number, or the Post Office Box number, and this will save the Post Office and the addressee alike considerable trouble and annoyance. Business men, however, should have the street and number, or the number of their Post Office Box, printed on their stationery so that their correspondents will avail themselves of the information.

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS.—Dr. Pethick, Chief Veterinary Inspector for this province, has been requested by Professor Grange, Dean of the Ontario Veterinary College, Toronto, to conduct the matriculation examinations for the College in Charlottetown. Heretofore students attending the Veterinary College were obliged to take their examinations in Toronto and run the chances there of success or failure. Under the present arrangement, in the event of failure they will be saved the expense of a trip to Ottawa and return. It will be remembered that the Ontario Veterinary College has recently been affiliated with the University of Toronto. The examinations this year will be held in Dr. Pethick's office, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, September 1st, beginning at 10 o'clock.

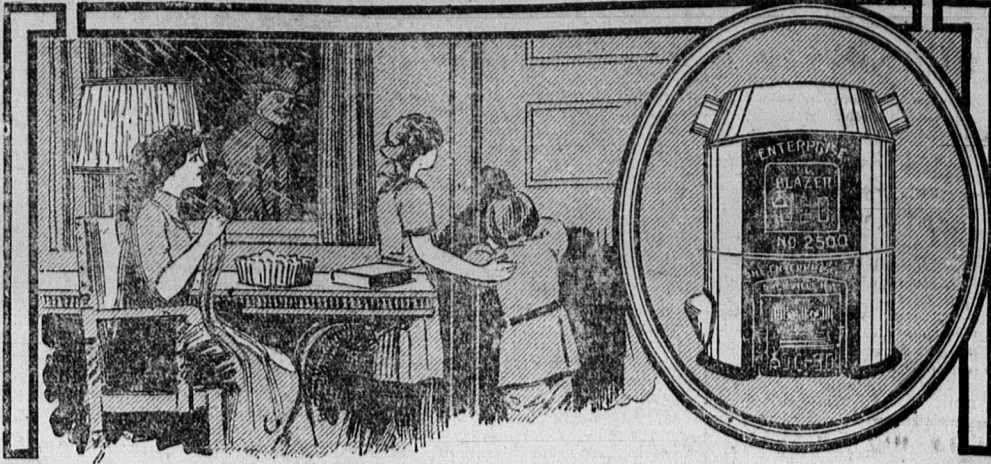
