The Tunnel Project Endorsed by the People of Summerside.

Summerside endorsed the Tunnel scheme as the best and only means of communication at a largely attended meeting in Market Hall last night called for the purpose of hearing the report of the delegates on their trip to Ottawa. A very attentive hearing was given each of the speakers, Rev. A. E. Burke, J. E. B. McCready, Neil McQuarrie, K. C., and Capt. Joseph Read, as in turn they explained the results of their mission to Ottawa and the paramount need of the Tunnel to fulfill the terms of confederation and to save the Island from its backward course. Nell Sinclair, Vice President of the Summerside Board of Trade, was chairman.

At the close of the addresses J. F. Blagdon moved a resolution thanking the delegates and endorsing the Tunnel scheme which was seconded by John H. Bell and carried unanimously by a standing vote.

A ladies' basketball club for Summerside is talked of.

Clovis Arsenault who has been ill for some days was reported very low last night.

It is the intention to make extensive repairs to St. Mary's Anglican Church in a short time.

Executions against defaulting rate payers for 1904 have been issued and are now in the hands of the police.

Special Lenten services are being held in St. Mary's Anglican church every evening except Saturday of this week.

The case against two young men for disorderly conduct and fighting on the streets will be heard at the Police Court today.

The Summerside Labor Union meet this evening at 7.30. There will be election of officers and other important business. All members are requested to attend.

John Henry was arrested on a warrant yesterday charged with assaulting and threatening to kill his wife. The case will be tried before Stipendiary McQuarrie this morning.

M. C. and Mrs. Delaney, North Tryon were in Summerside yesterday and Monday. Mr. Delaney returned home last evening. Mrs. Delaney will remain here for a few days.

Word has been received here by undertaker H. A. Compton that Beecher Harper, son of Mrs. James Harper, formerly of this town, was killed a few days ago in an accident while on his way to Denver, Colo. No further particulars of the accident were given. The letter stated also that Bruce, brother of deceased, is on his way home with the remains. The family are now residing in Boston having moved there from Summerside about a year ago.

Margate Notes—Prince William Division is flourishing with a membership of eighty seven. The school is progressing favorably under the able management of Miss Brown and Miss Ramsay. It is pleasing to learn that H. D. Thompson is recovering from his late illness. John, the little son of Kenneth McKay, while playing in his father's barn accidentally fell on a fork which entered the little fellow's arm near the elbow, but owing to the skillful aid of Dr. Jardine he is now doing well as can be expected.

Just think of the management of the Government hay business. The Stanley with 12 cars of it leaves Pictou for Souris. When she arrives there there is no provision made for taking the hay from the ship; so she goes to Georgetown with it, and there on account of splendid management of the P. E. I. Railway, she can only find room for 4 cars of the long-looked-for feed. So she carries back to Pictou 8 cars of it to be carried back another day to the Island. How long will she have to keep this hay on board before they find a place to land it? Why not bring it to Summerside? It would be easy to land it here. But that is not all. While the steamer is carrying the hay back and forward across the Strait, the cattle are starving, and there are hundreds of cars of freight at Pictou which the traders want for their customers. Surely there should have been a little extra push on the part of the Railway management to keep the stuff hauled away from the little wharf at Georgetown so that the hay might be landed, also a little foresight and business sense displayed by the Government in the matter of taking the hay from the vessel at Souris. But this is in keeping with the management of public matters for some years past. No wonder our best blood is leaving the Island. A Summerside trader who has goods at Pictou waiting shipment.

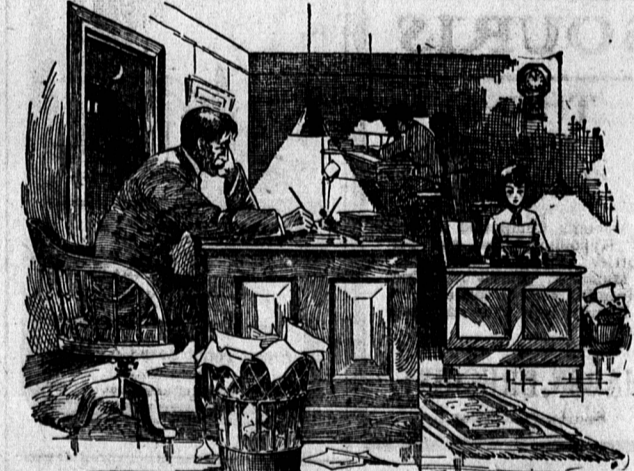
